ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS FOR

State Scholarships in Engineering Courses

AT THE Johns Hopkins University

BALTIMORE, MD.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS for the School of Engineering, as well as for the College of Arts and Sciences, will be held in the Civil Engineering Bldg., Homewood, each day.

APPLICANTS FOR SCHOLARSHIPS IN THE SCHOOL OF ENGINEERING are qualified under the provisions of the Laws of Maryland, Chapter 90, 1912, will now be received. If there is more than one applicant for a particular scholarship, a competitive examination must be taken Friday, September 23d, 1921, beginning at 9 a. m. Appointments will be made soon thereafter.

Each Legislative District of Baltimore City and each County of the State, with the exception of Cecil, Howard, Harford and Queen Anne, will be entitled to one or more scholarships for the year 1921-1922, in addition to those which have already been awarded. These scholarships may be awarded at large.

Under the provisions of the Act of Assembly, the County and City Scholarships in the School of Engineering are awarded only to deserving students whose financial circumstances are such that they are unable to obtain an education in Engineering unless free tuition be granted to them. The scholarships extend the holders to free tuition, free use of books, and exemption from all regular fees. One of the scholarships in each County and in each Legislative District of the City carries also the sum of \$200, and is known as a "Seasonal Scholarship." Seasonal Scholarships may be awarded for more, Calvert, Kent, Montgomery, Prince George's, Somerset and Washington counties. Scholarships may be awarded to graduates of Loyola College, St. John's College, Agricultural College, Mount St. Mary's College and Rock Hill College.

Three scholarships may be awarded at large. The next session begins Tuesday, October 4th, 1921. For blank forms of application and for catalogues giving information as to examinations, award of scholarships, and courses of instruction, applicants should address—
