The Democratic local campaign for 1921 was launched this (Wednesday) morning under most favorable auspices, the managing body having named candidates to fill all vacancies, and a strong ticket is presented for the consideration of the electorate.

After repeated solicitation on the part of his many friends and Democrats, Mr. J. Allan Coad has consented to accept the nomination as candidate for the House of Representatives. His running mate, Mr. George L. Buckler, is also amply qualified to fill that most important position.

Mr. Coad, by his acceptance, has proven himself a Democrat most worthy of the support and admiration of all to whom the best interests of our country and State are uppermost considerations. His recent defeat in the local primaries was considered by him as precluding his acceptance of the nomination when first tendered, but repeated solicitation on the part of those most vitally interested in Democratic success and an earnest desire on his part to serve his party in

himself to be a member of his friends and neighbors. He was selected by the Governor as a member of the commission that made a survey of the different State departments with the view of co-ordinating them into greater efficiency, and when elected will prove a tower of strength in perfecting the reorganization plan, which is the most important measure of legislation since the "good roads act."

His record in the last Legislature is one to which he and his party can point with becoming pride, and with Mr. Pepperley in the Senate and these two in the House, it is abundantly evident that both county and State will be well and faithfully served.

Only a brief space remains in which much pre-election work must be done and hence it behooves everyone interested in the state's and county's welfare to make a vigorous campaign for the ticket.

Factional lines, if they made any difference, have been merged for the good of the party. Every one will receive fair and equitable treatment and representation and with such conditions prevailing the party will prove invincible in the coming election.

At the meeting of the Central Committee, held on Wednesday to complete the ticket, the matter of solidifying the party received particular attention. To promote harmony and to abolish factionalism by giving all elements a voice in party management, a resolution was adopted creating an Auxiliary Committee, composed of Lawrence P. Williams, Joseph A. Sauners, Matthew R. Bailey, Edelen Gough and George L. Buckler to act with the Central Committee.

LOST, BUT NOT FORGOTTEN.
Will Germany "forget" Or will it be as it was with the French on the Place de la Concorde: "Quand memme!" The illustrated papers indicate somewhat a people's thoughts. Look at them in Germany today! Take only the Illustrierte Zeitung as an example. The slogan is unmistakable: "Verloren, doch nicht vergessen!" Lost, but not forgotten. Every other picture is of a cathedral, a town, a province, a colony, an isolated piece of "Deutschum" abroad, a school in the Orient. The former German East Africa is called German East Africa. There is no mention of words, says the Christian Science Monitor. Week by week, the Germans find themselves regaled by illustrated representations of their life and kin in the East, the Far East, in Transylvania, in China and in Africa, Alsace-Lorraine, and the Saar region. The answer seems to be: Germany does not mean to forget.

A Chicago banker has found to his surprise that from a racial standpoint the Chinese were the most satisfactory depositors. They had the largest average accounts and the bank had never had any trouble or controversy with any of them. They asked no favors that the bank could not grant to its advantage, and they were willing to pay liberally for all accommodations. They worked hard, saved their money, took care of their own people and minded their own business, says the Los Angeles Times. To that extent, at least, they were ideal citizens. They never loafed or begged. There are not many Caucasian races represented here of which as much can be said. On the face of the showing made China ought to send a lot of missionaries into Wall street and other centers of wickedness in America.

Both employer and employee must be bound by the decisions of the Court of Industrial Relations in Kansas, according to a decision just made by the Kansas Supreme court. What brings the meaning of this statement home to the mass of the people, however, is the accompanying declaration that the wages paid to the employees of the meat packers are a matter of public concern, while "the determination of the sufficiency of such wages is a question affected with a public interest." There has been a general belief to this effect for a time, remarks the Christian Science Monitor, but the court decision is to be regarded as a definite view of the law.

Canada has not the developed resources of the United States, nor her extensive and well-olled machinery for carrying on commercial exchange, says the Detroit News. But she does possess an alertness and enterprise which will carry her a long way, and the time may come when the United States will find the northern neighbor a busy, but always friendly, competitor in the market which is particularly inviting to the business men of this country.

Pennsylvania police arrested a man on the charge of attempted arson, having illegal possession of two stills, defrauding the United States treasury, having unlawful possession of miah, and possession of two gallons of moonshine liquor. Oh, yes; he is charged also with disorderly conduct.

TAX AMENDMENTS
READY FOR SENATE

Maximum Surtax Rate Put at 50 Per Cent on Incomes Above \$200,000.

Washington.—Amendments to the pending Tax Revision Bill agreed to by Republican leaders in the senate were made public formally in advance of their consideration by majority members of the Finance Committee. They would provide for:

A maximum surtax rate of 50 per cent on that part of incomes in excess of \$200,000 in lieu of the committee plan for a 32 per cent maximum on the excess over \$60,000.
Repeal of the express, freight, passenger and Pullman transportation taxes, effective at the passage of the bill.

An increase from \$2.20 a gallon to \$4 a gallon in the tax on distilled spirits produced, imported or withdrawn from bond for use for industrial, medicinal or other purposes.

Restoration of the capital stock tax of \$1 on each \$1,000 of invested capital.

A graduated increase in the estate tax rates to a maximum of 50 per cent on the excess over \$100,000,000 in lieu of the present maximum of 25 per cent over \$10,000,000.

Repeal of the excises on sport goods, chewing gum, perfumes, essences, tooth and mouth washes and pastes, Antifreeze, toilet powders and soap and soap powders and other miscellaneous taxes sufficient to make up a cut of \$37,000,000.

Reduction in the tax on candy to 3 per cent with the elimination of the committee proposal for a 10 per cent tax on candy selling at wholesale for more than forty cents a pound.

WASHINGTON.—E. S. Elliott was appointed auditor of the Philippines.

PARIS.—General Pershing will not go to London to lay the Congressional Medal on the tomb of the British unknown soldier in Westminster Abbey, and if the ceremony is held another American officer will be designated to represent the United States. That announcement came from a most authoritative source.

BANGOR, Me.—Motorists arriving here from Aroostook County reported a brisk snowstorm in Northern Maine. The fall in Maple and nearby towns was more than six inches.

LONDON.—The extraordinary fall in oil shares stands as the feature of the week in the markets.

PARIS.—War between Italy and Jugo-Slavia became a grave possibility. Following Italy's declaration that Albania was under an Italian Protectorate, Premier Pachitch, or Serbia has ordered the mobilization of the classes of 1918-1919-1920, "to protect the Jugo-Slavian frontier from Albanian aggression."

TOPEKA.—The Kansas Court of Industrial Relations was again upheld by the Supreme Court in the Wolf Packing Company case.

OTTAWA.—Election results in Canada will be held December 6.

DETROIT.—Chief Justice Taft was re-elected president of the Unitarian conference at its closing business session here. This is his third consecutive term.

PARIS.—The British government has not notified General Pershing of any arrangement for placing the American Congressional medal on the tomb of the unknown British soldier in Westminster Abbey, and it was said there was a strong probability that the function would not be held.
