**PORTING UP.**—We are told that the people at Fort Lapwai are fortifying that place for the protection of the post from the Indians.

**ADJOURNED.**—The County Commission of this county have adjourned for this term, having transacted all the business before them.

**RUMORS.**—Why is it that so many rumors are in circulation about the present Indian war. There has been enough this week to make a good size book.

**ALMOTA.**—The Almota arrived here Monday night at 11 o'clock, with a good load of freight and several passengers. She returned about daylight the next morning.

**MULES GONE.**—A. Benson has let a number of his mules to the government, for to the front, they left the fore part of this week for Walla Walla.

**RACES.**—The races that came off on the 6th and 7th of July was attended with a goodly number of our citizens, and some came away from the track with less money than they had when they went there.

**SETTLERS LEAVING.**—We are informed that a great number of settlers are leaving the present country, on account of the Indian war, that are all set all over the country.

**A PURSE** of some twenty or twenty-five dollars was raised here for the purpose of paying the expenses of "Old Dutch Henry" to get him out of the country. A wise act.

**SHEEP.**—Mr. Hutchings who has had a lot of sheep on the opposite side of Snake river, crossed them over on to this side last week and is to take them to Camas Prairie east. So we are informed.

**IS IT RIGHT?**—To let an Indian go armed in the city? We saw, and so did others, an Indian parading our streets with two six shooters belted on him. Is this right and is there no law forbidding such an act in time of war?

**MINSTRELS.**—The Dumpy Minstrel troupe gave one of their entertainments at Clark's Hall Friday evening last, which was well attended by the people here, and they gave good satisfaction so far as we heard from.

**ORDERED TO THE FRONT.**—Gen. Wheaton, who has been stationed at Walla Walla for the past few weeks, has been ordered to take his position in the field. His family passed through here this week enroute to see him before he starts.

**IN TOWN.**—B. F. Morris and C. W. Case, of Mt. Idaho, was in town this week on a visit, they returned on Tuesday's stage. M. Feltis was also in town this week from Walla Walla. He told us that he was to turn over the stock on the lower road on Monday last to McMorris, the man who has got the contract for carrying the mail.

**SPY.**—There has been an Indian here for the last few days from Almota acting very suspicious about town. On being asked what he came here for, he replied that he came up to buy goods. He has been here since last Monday night, and as far as we can learn he has bought but few goods. Now, was he here for any good purpose or not? He returned on the Foxon on Thursday.

**AMIE FAXON.**—This steamer arrived here on Wednesday night at 12 o'clock with 30 tons of freight, and laid here until 9 o'clock the next morning, waiting for a company of soldiers that was to go aboard and proceed to Walla Walla. The soldiers arrived and she pushed off. A portion of Grostein & Binnard's pack mules were also on board. We give many thanks to Harry Kerrierson of the steamer for late papers.

**CHINA FEET.**—We are informed that a number of citizens went to the china merchants of this city and told them that they would have to take care of the chinamen that are in town, who have the leprosy, and keep them from selling liquor to Indians, and if they did not do so the authorities would take it in their own hands, and the chinamen said they would see to it and have them shipped out of the country. The question is, now, will they do it, and if they do not, will the authorities take it upon their hands?

Owing to not having anything from Walla Walla for the last two mails, we are unable to give proceedings of Constitutional Convention in our inside.

**AGRICULTURAL FAIR.**—We are under many obligations to the Walla Walla Agricultural Society for a complimentary ticket to the fair that is to take place September next. The junior member of the TELLER visited their fair a year ago, and pronounced it a well regulated institution and recommended to those who intend visiting that part of the country, at that time, to go and examine their grounds.

**PROF. LEOTARD** gave two entertainments in this city this week. His legerdemain cannot be beaten in any country and his gymnast is better than ever visited this part of the country. He is a man that does what he bills to do and does it to the satisfaction of his audience. He will give another entertainment on Monday next with an entire change of programme. And he wishes to inform the public that there will be no one connected with him. Don't fail to go for you will get the worth of your money.

**ATTEMPTED MURDER.**—On Friday last about 6 o'clock in the evening while J. Fix of this city and others were coming in from Lapwai, and had got as far as S. C. Thompson's place just out of town, they came upon an Indian who was trying to get at Lieut. Hains, who was going out to the post. The Indian made several attempts to cut Hains and his driver with a large knife, which he had in his hand, and on seeing the others coming he made for them and made the same attempt, but failed to accomplish what he wanted. By this time Fix got out of the buggy and secured a piece of rail which was handy and laid the red skin to the ground. He was brought to town and lodged in jail, and on Monday last was examined before H. O. Adams and was put under \$500 bonds to appear before the grand jury at its next term. We are told that he was one of the prisoners that was at Vancouver and brought back here and turned loose. He was drunk but that is no excuse.

**Letter from Genessee Valley.**

GENESSEE VALLEY, July 8th, 1878.

**ED. TELLER.**—The 4th of July in Genessee Valley. The morning of the 4th was bright and clear and for a few hours gave every evidence of being a beautiful day, but about noon, and while the families of the surrounding country were on their way to the grove where the celebration was to take place, a heavy rain set in, which drench'd men, women and children and put somewhat of a damper upon their feelings. After the storm Capt. Boeman's company of mounted volunteers with their gay uniform and highly polished rifles formed in procession and paraded through the town of Beemanville, down Chatham street to the City of Jerusalem, and back to the place of beginning. Capt. Shepard with his company of "Chicken Eaters," formed in the rear and conducted themselves in a becoming manner. After the parade an organization was formed as E. F. Walsh president and Squier Vernon as secretary. The declaration of Independence was read by Mr. John Evans, who is known to be a master in that line. Judge D. J. Warner of Lewiston was then introduced and delivered an oration which, for depth of thought, research and analysis of the history of our country, could not be surpassed by any public speaker in the territory. We take this occasion to thank the judge for contributing so much to our celebration, and hope at some future time to be able to show him how much we appreciate his kindness. In the evening the people enjoyed themselves in singing and dancing at the house of Mr. Beeman, and also at the house of Mr. Curtis, I would state in this connection that the City of Jerusalem is situated one mile south of Beeman's store, and bids far to be a thriving town. They have two stores, one kept by Mr. Levi and the other by Mr. Curtis. Altogether 3 stores and two blacksmith shops started in a country only one year old.

**VOLUNTEERS FIGHTING.**

Three Killed and five Wounded!

The following letters from Mr. Vinson to Charles Clark of Dayton are of thrilling interest. We know Mr. V., and know him to be a man of veracity:

PENDLETON, July 7, 1878.  
The volunteers were surrounded by the redskins, yesterday at the foot of the mountains; and after a very hot fight succeeded in getting away with all their wounded, five in number; and left three of their men dead on the field at Willow Springs between Birch and Butter creeks. Two companies of cavalry and two infantry left here yesterday for the field. More expected to day. Great excitement prevails. This town is being fortified. There is good reason to believe the Columbias and Warm Springs are allied to the hostiles. There are nearly 1,000 people in town, and arm-enough are expected to-day to arm all the men and boys in town. More to-morrow.

July 8, 1878.—Bro. Charley.—Pendleton is safe so far. The Indians are reported in several places. Howard with five companies at Pilot Pock P. O. last night. A messenger arrived a few moments ago, saying there is a battle between Gen. Howard and Indians at Butter creek P. O. going on now. Several teams loaded to-day with grub for troops at Butter creek. Houses burning to-day along the creeks. Four companies of 25 each organized here. One goes as escort for the teams.
