A new Incorporation.

Articles of incorporation were filed on Friday last in the County Clerk's office for the Columbia River Portage Railroad Company. Incorporators, U. B. Scott, Z. J. Hatch and S. H. Brown.

THE POLICY.—All tribal relations of Indians must be dissolved at once, make every Indian responsible for his individual action, make no more treaties or feed them at public expense, but give them the right to take land and cultivate it, and also punish them for every crime they commit.

W. Minor Roberts, Chief Engineer N. P. R. R. Co., arrived here Thursday and left on Friday for Spokane Falls. He is of opinion that an easy railroad grade over the Cascades has been found. He left two parties of engineers at work in the mountains. Mr. Roberts will return to this place next week.

Forty years ago Thursday, August 29th, Rev. Cushing Bells arrived at the Whitman Mission, near the present Whitman Station on the railroad, from Boston, Mass. He came overland with his bride. Last Thursday, when the old gentlemen took the stage for Colfax, he looked good for 40 years more.
