The contract awarded to Messrs. Ball & Platt by Col. J. M. Wilson, for a certain portion of the canal work at the Cascades, has been approved by the authorities at Washington.

THE CLEARWATER.—From Civil Engineer P. G. Eastwick it is learned that, upon making a thorough examination of Clearwater river, he found that by removing a few obstructions it could be made navigable for 75 miles above its mouth.

When the two above improvements and the canal at the Dalles are completed, we will have nearly 600 miles continuous steamboat navigation from the sea board eastward, through the largest and finest wheat country on the Continent.

THE MURDERED INDIAN.—Lieutenant E. S. Farrow has arrived at Walla Walla from the Umatilla Agency. From his statement it is evident that affairs there are most momentous.

TELEGRAMS.

A Negro Insurrection.

NATCHEZ, Oct. 15.—A courier who arrived from Waterproof, La., this evening, reports that 2,500 armed negroes surrounded Waterproof to-day and threatened to burn and sack the town.

Oct. 16.—The officers of the steamer Natchez report that a fight occurred with negroes yesterday in Goldman's field, four miles above Waterproof, in which it is said that thirty-six negroes were killed and the whole of them dispersed.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 16.—The city is full of wild rumors to-day about trouble in Texas parish. Governor Nichols reports receiving information that a fight had occurred at Waterproof in which negroes were killed, and that a company of militia from Natchez had arrived there.

Parish authorities ask for State troops. The Governor has ordered the Louisiana field artillery and the Crescent City battalions to be in readiness to receive marching orders by 8 A. M. to-morrow.

CHATTANOOGA, Oct. 16.—Four deaths from yellow fever during the past 24 hours, and 14 new cases. Energetic measures were taken to-day to depopulate the infected district.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 16.—Dispatches received from all points in the fever section show no material abatement of the disease.

At Yazoo City a very malignant and fatal form of fever has appeared.

MEMPHIS, Oct. 16.—Eight deaths during the past 24 hours; forty new cases—smallest since the fever began.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 17.—Seven deaths from yellow fever have occurred within the last week near Gallipolis, Ohio, where the hospital steamer was anchored.

COLUMBUS, Oct. 16.—Full official returns from all counties give the following as total vote cast for each candidate: For Secretary of State, Barnes, (Rep.) 274,120; Sharp, (Dem.) 270,966; Roy, (National) 38,332; Robinson, (Prohibition) 5,674.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Gen. O. O. Howard telegraphs from Fort Vancouver that a Umatilla Indian was murdered on the 29th ult. by white men, and that the Umatillas have within three weeks lost five hundred horses taken by whites.
