MONKEY MINERS.
Captain E. Metz, who was born in Yankton, S. Dak., tells the story of the queer little animals who work for him in the mines, says the Philadelphia Press. He is a typical New Englander from Vermont, and fought in the Union army during the rebellion and settled in the south after the war. His mines are situated near Chesterfield, in South Carolina, about twenty miles off the railroad.

"I have twenty-four monkeys," said he, "employed about my mines. They do the work well of seven able bodied men, and it is no reflection upon the human laborers to say that they do a class of work a man cannot do as well. In many instances they lead valuable aid where a man would be useless. They gather up small pieces of quartz that would pass unnoticed by the workman and pile them up in little heaps that can be easily gathered up on a shovel and thrown into the mill. They are exceedingly adept at catching the little particles. Their sharp eyes never escape the very things that human eyes would pass over."

"How did you first come to employ them?"
"When I went to digging gold I had two monkeys that were exceedingly interesting pets. They were constantly following me about the mines, and one day I noticed that they were busily engaged in gathering up little bits of quartz and arranging them in piles. They seemed to enjoy the labor very much and would go to the mines every morning and work during the day. It did not take me long to catch on to their value as laborers, for at that time our workingsmen, who are mostly colored men, were unskilled and inefficient. My two pets had not worked long before I decided to procure more. So I immediately imported a number, and now have two dozen working daily in and about the mines. It is exceedingly interesting to watch my pet monkeys teach the new ones how to work, and stranger to see how the newcomers take to it."

"Strange to say they control them selves. They work as they please, some times going down into the mines when they have cleaned all the debris on the outside. They live and work together without quarreling any more than men do. They are quite methodical in their habits and go to work and quit like true workmen."

DISCOVERED AT LAST.
NILES, Mich., Oct. 30.—The trail of Mrs. Eliza Davis for grand larceny has brought out the fact that Mrs. Monroe, Mr. Davis' mother, is in reality old Mrs. Bender of the notorious Bender family of Kansas. A requisition has been asked for, and as soon as it arrives the prisoner will be taken to Kansas for trial.

[The history of the Bender murders forms one of the bloodiest pages in the annals of crime. The Bender family kept a sort of log tavern on a lonely Kansas highway, and succeeded in murdering and robbing a large number of travelers before their terrible crimes were detected. Their mode of procedure was as follows: The unsuspecting victim would be given a seat at the dining table so that his head would come near a cloth partition, dividing two rooms. Old man Bender would take a position with an axe in the adjoining room, and when the victim's shadow showed that his head nearly or quite touched the cloth the gray-headed old murderer would strike and awful blow that would send the unsuspecting traveler to death without the slightest warning. The Benders would then rob the corpse and bury it in a cello beneath the house. One day the surrounding country became aroused over the mysterious disappearance of a prominent judge. He was traced to the Bender place, and their all clues ended. The Benders, becoming alarmed, fled in the night, none detecting their departure. The house was searched, and the whole world was startled and horrified at the disclosures.
That was years ago, but persistent research has failed to discover the whereabouts of the murderers. Detectives "spotted" scores of innocent immigrants and followed them over the West, but each alarm proved false, and the location of the Benders has remained one of the mysteries of American criminal annals. Their flight was greatly facilitated by the fact that at that time hundreds of thousands of immigrants were peopling the West, and the whole country was dotted with white tents and covered wagons.
The outcome of this latest discovery will be awaited with interest.—Ed.]—Ex.

The amount this latest deal involves is not known, but is supposed to be nearly \$13,000,000.
