### Billings to be Floated

The steamer Frederick J. Billings, owned by the Central Navigation & Construction Company, which went on the rocks at Riparia recently, may soon be off Gray's rocks and afloat again. Captain Whitcomb, port captain of the company, reports that without doubt the Billings will be floated, and beyond several small holes in her hull, will be as good as ever. Her position is peculiar. Both her bow and stern are lying over deep water, the depth of the water under her bow being 13 feet, and under her stern 11 feet. It is only the middle part of her hull that is imbedded on the rocks. There are two reefs running diagonally across underneath her, with a depth of water of nine feet between them. She is lying in a slanting position on one side, the water covering the reefs being at a depth of four feet and at the other side only one foot. The holes, five of them in number, are all patched up and all that remains to be done is to launch her from the ways.
