He is not unknown to public charities, in fact he has given quite freely to them, and we repeat, he is not ostentatious to any degree, yet wherever and whenever he has given to charity you will find that the lawyer's instinct that looks to the preserving of profits, has governed the act, for opposite the figures that represent his giving in all cases you will find written in a clear and legible hand, Benjamin Harrison.

The Lexington Investigation.—Twelve men Bound Over

The investigation into the recent lynching at Lexington terminated last Thursday, having been in progress since the preceding Monday. The State concluded its testimony Thursday and the defence introduced none. The result was that twelve men were bound over to the next term of Davidson Superior Court, as follows: John Wood, John Wilson, John Myers, J. N. Myers, Charles Swicegood, Will Livengood, David Myers and John Ferree in bonds of \$5,000; Plunk Daniels in a bond of \$2,500; McDuff Ferree, Henderson Shoaf and W. W. Myers in bonds of \$1,000 each. Six of these men were positively and unmistakably identified as having been in the lynching party. Gov. Fowle,

Judge Phillips and Solicitor Long have done their full duty in the matter thus far; it now remains to be seen what the grand and petit juries of Davidson county will do. The overwhelming sentiment of the people of the State is with the civil authorities. It is the first time in the history of the State that a mob has ever been called to account, but this fact makes the recent proceeding only the more to be commended. The next mob that assembles in North Carolina will probably think twice, it being seen that the going of a lot of murderers in a body does not grant them immunity from subsequent molestation.

It is known to but few persons here, but the affidavits upon which Judge Phillips issued his bench warrants in this case were sworn to here, before J. H. Hill, Esq., clerk of Iredell Superior Court, by Andrew Berrier, the father of the man who was lynched. He has means, and it is said that he will do his part toward seeing that the murder of his son is avenged. He has retained W. B. Glenn, Esq., of Winston, to assist Solicitor Long in the prosecution of the cases, and Mr. Glenn was present during the last two days of the preliminary examination.

Hunting the Evil One.

Intense excitement was created at Goochland, Va., during a church meeting by the appearance of Amy Boggs, a small colored girl, in the congregation flourishing a razor. Men, women and children ran in all directions. Some women fainted others tumbled in the mud, and the girl was soon in possession of the church, her eye glaring and her slight figure trembling with frenzy. When she had driven the last person from the church she cried out: "Now, I want to see the devil?" She was finally overpowered by the constables, and, on examination, showed that she was in a religious ecstasy, and was looking for the devil, whose throat she had taken a vow to cut.
