A vote cast against the A amendment will be a vote cast to continue the negro as a voter and if that be cast by a white man, it will be the most distinctive vote ever cast against his race; it will be a distinct vote for the negro; a distinct vote against the white man; and it will be a declaration on his part that he thinks the negro is as good as the white man; it will be a protest on his part against the white man's having anything that the negro doesn't have it will be a vote for the continuation of race trouble and conflict and clash, and finally it will be a vote which cannot possibly help even the negro for which it is cast, since if he could succeed in defeating the purpose of the white men, as expressed in this amendment, the race question (in the settlement of which he is as much interested as the white man) will still remain unsettled, with the fixed and irrevocable purpose on the part of the whites as we have said before, to settle it, if not in one way then in another, but to settle it, and settle it forever.—F. There is no word in the amendment requiring a property qualification. A man does not have to own \$300 worth of property to vote. It makes no difference whether he has a dollar's worth or not. If he or any of his forefathers was a voter in 1867, or if he can read and write he can vote. Provided only that he has paid his poll-tax if required by law to do so.—E. C. Beddingfield.
