New Town Ordinances.

At a meeting of the Board of Town Commissioners the following laws were passed:

Any person found drunk or intoxicated within the corporate limits of the town of Boone shall, upon conviction, be fined \$15.00 and cost.

It shall be unlawful for any person to park or stop an automobile or other motor vehicle for more than ten (10) minutes directly in front and adjacent to any occupied business house or hotel in the corporate limits of the town of Boone. Any person or persons violating this act shall, upon conviction, be fined \$3.00 and cost.

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to play ball on the streets or sidewalks in the corporate limits of the town of Boone. Any person or persons violating this act, shall upon conviction, be fined \$1.00 and cost.


