MURDER IN THE FIRST DEGREE. Grand Jury Finds True Bill Against Lyme Men for Killing Woman—Norwich Town Man Sent to State Prison—Pleas of Guilty and Sentences.

The grand jury finished the evidence in the case against the two men charged with killing a woman in Lyme, December 7, on Wednesday afternoon.

Burns Woman Under \$7,000 Bonds. When the superior court opened on Wednesday morning, State Attorney Hull presented Mrs. Addie Burns of New London, stating that she had been arrested on a bench warrant, and asked that she be put to plea.

Pleas of Guilty and Sentences. This case and the general interest in the court business filled the court room with spectators, who, with the large number of witnesses summoned, occupied about all the available space in the large court room during the most of the day.

Mehrholz Sent to State Prison. A jury was then about to be selected for the trial of the case of state vs. August Mehrholz, charged with incest in Norwich last October.

ACTIVE SEARCH FOR PRIEST. Charged with Abducting a Seventeen-Year-Old Girl. Newark, N. J., Jan. 6.—Miss Bridget King, who was wanted on a charge of aiding in the alleged abduction of seventeen-year-old Julia Teresi by the other Nicola's Slani, a curate of St. Rocco's Roman Catholic church of this city, surrendered herself to the authorities today and was immediately arraigned in court and held in \$2,500 bail for the action of the grand jury.

NO GREAT EPIDEMIC. Likely to Follow the Disaster in Italy, Says Surgeon General Wyman. Washington, Jan. 6.—"It does not seem probable that any great epidemic will follow the earthquake in Italy," declared Surgeon General Wyman of the public health and marine hospital service in a statement for the Associated Press today.
