The Handy Safety Pin.

A safety pin makes a capital substitute for a bodkin when mending a lace in a casing. In fact, it is sometimes superior to a bodkin for the purpose. For the point of the bodkin is apt to pierce the material, while the sharp point of the pin and then use the closed pin as a bodkin.

Dresses for Small Boys.

Cute little dresses for small boys are made from white rep. There are the little knickers and the over blouse formed with one deep collar, the shoulders back and front facing inward. The bottom is finished with a deep hem, and the sleeves are in the conventional style, plain or with a little ruffle at the wrists to form cuffs, and an emblema is worked on the breast or the sleeve, as preferred. Rep gives good wearing, and the fabric is light, requiring no starch, and very little ironing. Three and one-half yards will be sufficient to make a suit for a boy 4 years of age.

Use for Bicycle Pump.

If you have an old bicycle pump which you do not use, you can give good service when next you clean your sewing machine. This "piece of lint, threads and the like can be blown out of the crevices and the machine cleaned in much less time.

Polish for Jewelry.

Small articles of jewelry can be made to look as bright as new by applying the soft amber polish that resembles vaseline.

A Violet Box.

A dainty present from one girl to another is a violet box. A violet-colored box should be chosen, and in this, place a violet cotton, should be a little bottle of good violet extract, a package of violet-scented powder, a piece of pale-colored ribbon to run in, underwear, and a set of violet sachets, made of violet silk, with tiny clasp around the edge. The sachets consist of two large flat ones, and two small drawers, three small ones to put among the ribbons and handkerchiefs and neckwear, one or more little ones to wear tucked into the garter, and a round flat one to be sewed in the crown of the hat.

To Repair Gas Hose.

If there is a leak in the gas hose, cover the spot with melted paraffine; when cool, varnish with shellac varnish. This will remedy an old hose, making it useful for many more months.

Frayed Buttonholes.

If buttonholes have to be made on a material that frays badly, proceed as follows: Mark the position of buttonhole with a thread, then run a line of machine stitching round the thread. Then cut the hole and buttonhole it in the usual manner. This will prevent any fraying.

To Improve Eyes.

Hollow places under the eyes can be filled out by massage and the constant use of a good skin food. Much benefit will come from bathing the eyes every morning with cold salt water, and by applying occasionally a compress of rosewater.

Attractive Night Lamps.

Night lamps, whether oil lamps or kerosene, are usually attractive this season. They may be had in brass and copper as well as other metals.

For Sunken Cheeks.

For sunken cheeks one ounce of lanolin mixed with one-half ounce of cocoa butter and rubbed into the face with a rotary and upward motion is an accepted specific.
