FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL.

DESULTORY TRADING. By Professionals—Some Individual Stocks Rose in Price. New York, Jan. 15.—Desultory trading by professional operators made up a quiet market with a few stocks that did not differ much in that respect from previous days this week. The professional traders talked much of the size of the short market in the market and a belief in its unwieldy proportions had as much to do with the caution of the bear element and the firm tendency as any happening of favorable support to values. The rise in price of a number of individual stocks was due to special news and their strength in some sympathetic effect in sustaining other stocks. Very circumstantial reports were current of the intention to incorporate the Wisconsin Central into the Canadian Pacific group. The rise in the Seaboard bituminous coal carriers was the effect of the great increase in earnings disclosed by the Baltimore and Ohio for the last half of the calendar year, disclosed by yesterday's semi-annual report. The Transim once again responded to a rumor that an initial dividend was to be declared on the stock. The movement of the general list was languid and indifferent in spite of the wide movements in these special stocks. The demand was not sufficiently aggressive to promote an effective upward movement, and the dependence on the uncovered short interest in the estimates of an advance in the price of spring cloths was welcomed as a possible index of some commercial improvement, but this was rather more than offset by another recession in the price of copper at the New York metal exchange. Stocks of copper are said to be accumulating. The metal industry, in consequence, were rather heavy, including United States Steel and did not share in the occasional upward movement of prices. A feature of the day's money market was the reported lending of a round amount for thirty days at 1-1/2 per cent, a rate considerably below the prevailing call loan rate, and arguing the expectation, therefore, of lower money rates. The estimates of the week's currency movement show that cash is continuing to flow to the New York banks in large amounts. The financial world awaits with much interest the effects to follow the issue of the Russian loan in Paris next week. There is an undercurrent of uneasiness lest the Russian loan issue shall not put an end to the policy of accumulation of gold on the part of the French bank in which event it will be concluded that some ulterior motive exists which may preclude a political upheaval in the near future. Bonds were firm. Total sales, par value, \$4,242,000. United States bonds two registered declined 1-8 per cent. on call.

MISTAKES OF YOUNG PITCHERS.

Joe Says They Depend Too Much on Speed When in a Fix. "Have you ever noticed that when a pitcher, especially if he is new at the game, is getting his bumps, how much faster and harder he works?
