WESTERLY BOARD OF TRADE

Hears Encouraging Reports at Tuesday Evening's Meeting—Desire to Re-elect President Perry—Pawcatuck Retail Merchants' Association Holds Annual Meeting—Probate Court News—Trolley Extension Needed to Woody Hill.

Judge Edward M. Burke held a regular session of the Westery probate court Tuesday afternoon. The petition of David McLaren, administrator of the estate of William Smith, for leave to erect a suitable monument at grave of deceased and that reasonable amount be allowed for that purpose was decided. The court allowed the sum of \$225, which was by agreement satisfactory to all parties in interest.

The February meeting of the Westery Board of Trade was held in the town hall Tuesday evening. President Charles Perry presiding and a large number of members in attendance. The minutes of the previous meeting were read by Secretary Albert E. Stillman and approved.

The names of E. W. Clark, J. Frank Champlin, Joseph Frazier and Henry Burdick were proposed for membership and, according to the rules, the names were referred to the committee on membership.

The entertainment committee made report of the recent banquet committee, showing a total expense of \$216. The report was received, approved and ordered recorded.

Dr. John Champlin of the trades and manufactures committee reported that they had been in consultation with parties who desired to locate in Westery, and prospects are bright for the location of the Narrow Fabric company. Three locations have been offered for a site, two on the Rhode Island side and one on the Connecticut side of the Pawcatuck river.

The Brownstone Quarry company, with headquarters in Providence, has for the past two years been operating a granite quarry in the Woody Hill section of the town of Westery. Effort is being made to have trolley line extension to the quarry and if this is accomplished the entire plant, said to be quite extensive, will be transferred from Providence to the town of Westery.

Wilfred Collins, who was ordered to pay stipulated sums to the overseer of the poor for the town of Hopkinton, to prevent a child born to Miss Grace Ann Buck becoming a charge upon the town, has taken appeal from the order of the Third district court. With his mother as surety, Collins filed a bond of \$200 with the district court to prosecute his appeal in the superior court.

The Westery and Pawcatuck Retail Merchants' Business association, although instrumental in forming the Westery Board of Trade, remains its original organization, in advancing the best business interests of its members, and the places from which it takes its name, without conflicting in any way with the work of the Board of Trade. Nearly all the association members also have membership in the Board of Trade and are on the most important committees of that organization.

The annual meeting was held in the Dixon house early Tuesday evening to permit the members to attend the monthly session of the Board of Trade. Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: Joseph T. Murphy, president; Charles H. Stanton, vice president; Irvine O. Chester, secretary; E. Howard Clark, treasurer; Michael Higgins, Francis G. Haswell, George E. Brughton, Frederick L. Duch, Everett D. Saunders, Louis Tjeb, board of directors.

The Stonington selectmen have appointed John S. Gilmore janitor of the town court and James McDonough of Mystic surveyor of wood and measurer of lumber.

The flag on Memorial building was at half mast Tuesday in respect to the memory of John Delevan, who died suddenly in Woonsocket Saturday and was buried in Westery.

The London Belles, with Tony Kennedy of Pawcatuck, formerly of Norwich, and Mrs. Kennedy as special attractions, are performing this week in the Gaiety Theatre, St. Louis.

Governor Pothier has nominated William F. Goodwin of Saylesville for the position of state sealer of weights and measures, made vacant by the death of Capt. George H. Pettus.

It is alleged that men of prominence in Westery are urging residents of the town to petition the legislature to compel the Groton and Stonington Railway company to reduce the fare to five cents between Stonington and Westery.
