Hill's Record Single At Duckpins Rolls 127 on Westerly Alleys—Both Norwich Teams Win Matches—Britt Loses Decision to Johnny Summers—Sports of the Holiday.

One bit of feature work was done Monday evening in the two matches played at the Eastern Connecticut duckpin league, when C. Leroy Hill of the Norwich team No. 1 beat the high single record for the league by putting down a single of 127, beating out the previous record holder, Cliff of New London No. 2, who had a mark of 114.

Warriors Win Three Straight. On the Rose alleys, Captain Harris led his Norwich Warriors to a three straight win over Captain Dalton's New London team No. 3. Every man on the winning team hit the hundred mark or over at least once, and Harris topped it off with the high 121 and three strikes out.
