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WESTERLY VISITING NURSE SOCIETY

Discusses Ways and Means at Meeting Monday—Three Grades of Memberships Advocated—Fast Basketball—Handsome Monument to William Smith—Arch-deacon Brown to Conduct Lenten Service—Nineteenth Birthday of Edwin A. Scholfield.

The ways and means committee of the Westery Visiting Nurse society held a session in the conference room of the Public Library and Memorial building Monday afternoon, and arranged for a plan of canvass for funds and membership, along lines adopted by societies of United Workers. All membership is to be active, although designated in three classes: Regular membership, with annual dues of \$1; associate members, \$5; sustaining members, \$25. It has been decided to secure a nurse as soon as possible, and that she be given a few weeks' additional study with the district nurses of Providence, so as to familiarize herself with the system before beginning work in Westery. The limits of the service will be the same as covered by the mail delivery service of the Westery postoffice and White Rock which extends as far south as River Bend cemetery and Clarkville, north to the north end of High street, Stillmanville and White Rock; to the east as far as the Tower and Oak street districts and Franklin street to the Quarry Hill school, and west to the Moss farm.

A fast game of basketball was played in Hibernian hall Saturday evening, the contesting teams being the Westery Cyclones and Rhode Island college. Both teams played a good, close game, and at the end of the first half the score was even, 14 and 14. In the second half, by very fast playing, the Cyclones won the game, with the final score 36 and 24. Sullivan was the star of the college team, while John and McMahon played brilliantly for the Cyclones. Both teams played fine basketball and were right on the money from start to finish. Smith of the "arsity" team refereed and gave satisfaction. The lineup was as follows: Kenyon—Allen and Hall, forwards; Kenyon, center; McMahon, Moore and Steplin, guards.

R. E. College, Sullivan, Daniels and Wagner, forwards; Dean, center; Wheeler and McKenzie, guards. There will be another game in Westery between these teams the latter part of April.

A fine granite monument has been erected in River Bend cemetery to William Smith, a former foreman at the New Britain Granite Works, who was killed about a year ago by a falling derrick. The petition of the administrator of the estate, made at the request of the children of deceased, to the probate court, asking for the privilege of erecting a monument at the expense of the estate, was objected to by Mrs. Smith. After several hearings the court allowed \$250 for the purpose.

Mrs. Smith's children wanted a monument to their father manufactured from stone quarried under his direction, just the kind he would probably have selected, and favored the expense being borne by the estate, in which they are interested. The court decreed otherwise, however, and they paid the difference, and the Smith monument is among the handsomest in the cemetery.

The monument is all polished and is made of three bases, die, plint and a column surmounted with an urn, the whole being 18 feet in height.

The Westery ministers held their regular monthly session Monday evening, and entered upon his duties as secretary Cortelyou, and other officers of the department, to the number of fifty or more. At the conclusion of the ceremony Mr. Cortelyou was presented on behalf of the officers of the department with a large silver loving cup.

Mr. Cortelyou will remain in town until late in the present month when he will go to New York to become president of the Consolidated Gas company of that city.

Charles E. Taylor, a Washington newspaper man, was today appointed secretary to Secretary Meyer of the navy department.

EX-SECRETARY CORTELYOU May Be President of New York Consolidated Gas Company. Washington, March 8.—Former Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou, it is rumored, will go to New York City, probably the latter part of this week or early next week, to confer with the directors of the Consolidated Gas company regarding the presidency of that company, which Mr. Cortelyou has been asked to take. Mr. Cortelyou has been occupied since inauguration time in closing up the affairs of his office preparatory to handing them over to his successor in the secretaryship, Franklin MacVeagh. Some details of the announcement concerning Mr. Cortelyou's plans it is expected, will follow his consultation with the Consolidated Gas company officials in New York.

M'VEAGH TAKES OATH. Enters Upon His Duties as Secretary of the Treasury.

Washington, March 8.—Franklin MacVeagh of Chicago took the prescribed oath of office this afternoon and entered upon his duties as secretary of the treasury in President Taft's cabinet. The oath was administered in the presence of retiring Secretary Cortelyou, and other officers of the department, to the number of fifty or more.
