STOCK PRICES. Large and Varied Volume of Business.—Industrials and Specialties Conspicuous. New York, April 12.—Speculative operations for the advance were renewed with fresh confidence today in the stock market, and the prices were carried comprehensively upwards on a large and varied volume of business. The indication manifest last week on account of the approach of the three days' vacation was largely dissipated with the passing of the holiday, although the foreign market was still in recess and took no part in the day's dealings in this market. This deducted a considerable volume of activity from the market, the operations for foreign account having constituted an important influence in the market for some time past. The speculative element at home seemed content to carry forward the movement without waiting for the foreigners to declare themselves. The industrials and specialties still held a conspicuous place in the day's most notable movements, but not so entirely to the exclusion of the standard trade stocks as was the case on Thursday before the holiday. There was appreciable improvement in the market in this respect with the course of the day. The prompt emergence from the senate committee on finance of the amended tariff bill created a strong impression without much regard to the changes in the rates proposed, the promise of despatch in the progress of the bill being more considered than the substance of the amendments. The restoration of iron ore to the dutiable list as proposed in the senate amendments induced an active demand for United States Steel and this had a sympathetic effect in reviving demand for the whole list. The tone of the market developed considerable irregularity in the late dealings, but many substantial gains were left for the day's showing. Bonds were active and strong. Total sales, par value, \$1,250,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.
