SHARPER GETS GOLD IN WESTERLY

Col. George A. Forsyth of Providence, in command of first district Coast artillery, of Rhode Island, and who began his military career as a private in the Westerly Rifles in 1872, has resigned, and by recent act of the general assembly will be retired as brigadier general.

Upon the organization of the First Rhode Island United States Volunteer Infantry for service in the Spanish war the governor appointed Forsyth a captain of volunteers and he was with the regiment during the eleven months' service.





