Awards Contract for Building to the R. A. Sherman's Sons Co.—No Opposition to G. & S. Cars Entering City—Death of Patrick Kane—Wm. Bromley Injured—Entertainment at Baptist Church.

There is no longer doubt that the Westeryly Narrow Fabric company will locate in Westeryly, with prospect of becoming a leading local industry. There were ten bidders for the contract to construct the mill building, including the R. A. Sherman's Sons company, the Maxson company and Hancock & Wilcox. The contract was awarded to the lowest bidder, the R. A. Sherman's Sons company. The building will be constructed of Ashaway brick, of which there have been 600,000 already delivered, and the active work of construction has commenced.

The building first to be erected will be one story, 137 by 123 feet, with boiler room 25 by 32 feet, and will be designated as the weave shed. The building will have windows on the sides and ends and be supplied with twenty-eight skylights. The contract requires that the building be completed by Aug. 15, and soon thereafter the plant will be in operation, supplied with the Sizer patent narrow fabric looms, which are controlled by the local company.

fare to five cents between Stonington and Westeryly or keep on your own side of the Pawcatuck river. Although in this instance the petitioners for extension and connection of tracks was the Pawcatuck Valley road, free permission is given the Connecticut company to do business in Rhode Island, provided satisfactory arrangements can be made with the other local operating companies, as the meter is entirely with the trolley companies.

The petitioning company is planning to complete the proposed extension by Sept. 1, and it is expected that soon thereafter the terminal at the Groton and Stonington road will be in Dixon square or possibly the station of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad company, instead of the center of the Broad street bridge, as at present. This change would be greatly appreciated by the general public, especially by the passengers from the west. At present those passengers are inconvenienced in making connections with the Norwich, Ashaway or Watch Hill roads, which would be materially lessened by a change in terminal.
