To Whom It May Concern.—At a meeting of the Court of Common Council held at the Court Chamber on Friday evening, May 21, 1909, the following report of the Committee on Finance was accepted and the resolution accompanying the same adopted:

Norwich, Conn., May 21, 1909. To the Court of Common Council: The Committee on Finance present their estimate of the expenses of the City and of each department thereof, during the year ending on the 31st day of May 1910, and of the receipts for the same period, as follows:

ESTIMATED EXPENSES. Department of Public Works—Ordinary street expenses \$23,000.00 Garbage and ashes 6,000.00 Sewers and catch 4,000.00 Macadam repairs 2,000.00 Street sprinkling 5,000.00 Parks and trees 1,000.00 Steam road roller 2,500.00 Crescent street sewer 2,000.00 School street sewer 400.00 Boswell avenue sewer 2,000.00 T. A. M. street sewer 2,000.00

Department of Cemeteries—Fire Department—Police Department—Salaries, payrolls, etc. \$25,000.00 City Court 2,000.00 Street Lighting—Health Department—Salaries 4,000.00 Disinfectants, etc. 1,500.00

Gas and Electrical Department—Operating and general expenses \$95,000.00 Fixed charges (interest on bonds) 20,000.00

To meet the expenditures called for by their estimates, a tax of 10 mills on the last City list will be required, said list being \$12,884.47.

In addition to the above estimated expenses for ordinary purposes of the government, the Committee on Finance has requested by petition, committee reports, etc., to bring before the next annual meeting for its action estimates of the cost of the following improvements and expenditures prayed for, to wit:

Celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Town, 150th Anniversary of the Incorporation of the City. Salary and expenses of Milk Inspector 1,500.00 Public contract accommodations 1,000.00

For macadamizing Sacham street 2,000.00 For widening West Main street 2,000.00 For Cliff street improvement 1,000.00 For new steam fire engine 1,500.00

The sum of these estimates is equal to about 1 1/2 mills on the grand list. The Committee recommend that the warrant for the next annual City Meeting include the last named estimates and a call for action thereon.

At a City Meeting held March 26, 1909, the Court of Common Council was authorized to appropriate from the City Treasury such an amount not exceeding \$20,000 as may be necessary to pay the expense of erecting a new dam and appurtenances at Meadow Brook and of acquiring lands, rights and other property for the conservation of the water supply, but the resolution adopted at said meeting did not provide the method of raising the sums necessary for such expenditures.

Your Committee recommend that inasmuch as said appropriation is made for a permanent improvement and in addition to the water supply, the expense thereof should not be included in the ordinary expenses of the current year, and your Committee recommend that the warrant for the next annual City Meeting shall include a proposition authorizing the borrowing of such sum upon the notes of the City payable in four equal annual installments and that the same be liquidated from the receipts of the water department.

Under an act of the General Assembly approved June 12, 1897, the City Commissioners, the Mayor of the City and the Selectmen of the Town of Norwich were constituted a Board for the execution of the addition to the Court House in Norwich and were authorized to borrow such sum as might be necessary for the erection of such addition and to execute notes for the sum so borrowed, which notes shall be binding and obligatory upon the County of New London, the Town of Norwich and the City of Norwich.

Pursuant to law, such Board has executed its note for the sum of \$50,000 expended in the erection of such addition and it is desirable that the joint obligation so created should be replaced by separate obligations for the proportion of the expense which each interest is to bear. The City's proportion thereof has been determined as provided in the Act to be the sum of \$10,000.

Your Committee therefore recommend that there shall be included in the warrant of the next annual City Meeting a proposition to authorize the execution and delivery of the obligation of the City for \$10,000 for its proportion of the expense of Court House addition upon the retirement of the joint obligation now outstanding.

Your Committee further recommend that there be included in the warrant of the next annual City Meeting a proposition to authorize the sale of the fire station property situated on West Main street and of the fire station property situated on Boswell avenue, the same being no longer required for the purposes of the fire department, and that the moneys realized therefrom be appropriated for the fitting up of the fire station, to provide for the installation of a steam fire engine and chemical engine for the protection of that section of the City in accordance with the recommendations of the Committee on Fire Department.

Your Committee further recommend the adoption by the Court of Common Council of the following resolution: Resolved, That the report and estimates of the Committee on Finance be accepted and approved; that the Clerk cause the same to be published as required by the amended charter of the City and that the Mayor, or in his absence the Senior Alderman present, be directed on behalf of the Court of Common Council to submit the estimates embraced in this report to the next City Meeting to be held on the first Monday of June next and to recommend that a tax of 10 mills be laid on the last perfected grand list of the City.
