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THE ONLY MAN.

The reading public ought to be aware that there is only one man who can represent public matters just as they are, and that man is Citizen Charles F. Thayer.

He didn't collide with the books of the city treasurer—as a political navigator he steered clear of them; and we once again invite the attention of the taxpayers to the account of the Norwich gas and electric department as they appear upon the books of the city treasurer:

THE TEN-MILL TAX. Citizen Charles F. Thayer declares that a 10-mill tax will not meet the current expenses of the city, although it is only about four years ago that he was telling the people that he could meet municipal expenses upon 9 mills—that they were sufficient, and with the ownership of public utilities it would go to 7 mills, and 7 mills, and that finally Norwich would become a taxless city. Since that notable day an attempt was made to run the affairs of the city of Norwich on a 9-mill tax and the result was a floating debt of \$50,000; and since that time the tax has been as high as 13 mills.

The Bulletin said 9 mills was not sufficient, and if we go on increasing the permanent expenses as we have for the past six years it will not be long before 13 mills will be as insufficient as was the 9-mill experiment. The popular tax levy is 10 mills, and the republicans proposition is to carry the city down to that and through on that if the citizens will keep the appropriations in accord with these figures. To vote appropriations of 14 mills or 13 mills when the tax levy is ten mills spells in plain English that it cannot be done.

It is up to the citizens to keep this within bounds. For the eleven months of the fiscal year now completed the receipts of the national treasury have fallen short of meeting the expenditures by \$97,383,102. There is yet an available cash balance in the treasury of \$118,378,764, and of this \$40,329,000 is a workable balance. It cannot be disguised that the Dingley bill is insufficient to meet present expenses. New sources of revenue must be found and it would be, indeed, a sad mistake if the tariff measure in its complete and unadorned acceptance should fall to provide the revenue required to meet expenses.

Woman in Life and in the Kitchen

FOR WOMEN AND THE HOME. A little water in the tubs or buckets will prevent them from falling to pieces. Pastry brushes should be washed as soon as used and put in a warm place to dry.

Brine for pickling should be made strong enough to bear up an egg, or a small potato. Prunes are greatly improved by adding a little cider to the water in which they are cooked.

Keep macaroni in an air-tight receptacle and plunge them into boiling salted water before cooking. A few drops of coal oil added to the water with which windows are to be washed will save time and labor.

In turning a steak do not use a fork as the holes which it makes in the meat will cause the blood to run out. Indian cornmeal boiled with milk, sweetened with sugar and dash of cream, is a good fattener for thin children.

NEEDLEWORK SUGGESTIONS.

Paris Transfer Pattern No. 8000. Design to be transferred to a shirt waist of linen, muslin, batiste, silk, satin, messaline or organdie, to be worked with mercerized cotton or silk floss in eyelet design and trimmed with fine lace insertion. The collar and cuffs design is given with the shirt waist. If made up in silk or satin, the design should be carried out in eyelet stitch with a very delicate shade of blue, light blue or pink or Nile green silk floss, the insertions being cream color instead of white. Price of pattern, 10 cents.

Paris Transfer Pattern No. 8014. Design to be transferred to a baby's nightgown jacket, developed in fine French flannel, or batiste, or muslin, or silk, the latter lined with quilted silk or flannel in white or some delicate shade of pink or blue, the scalloping being done with mercerized cotton or silk floss in solid stitch, the design also being done in solid stitch. The flannel may be polka dotted or striped left unlined if desired, and the edges may be bound with colored silk ribbon if the scalloped edge is not wanted. Price of pattern, 10 cents.

FANS.

Fans of all kinds have never been more popular than this spring. Large feather ones are being carried with sticks of rattan, bamboo or cane. Some are of tortoise shell closely inlaid with an arabesque design of gold. The combination of the dark shell with the gold is extremely rich. SMALL IRONING BOARD.
