FRILLS OF FASHION FOR QUICK READING. THIS NET WAIST CAN BE EASILY COPIED.

Ottoman silk is still popular, but has a rival in the new tussore. "Fuffed out very full in the back" is the Paris decree for the hair.

Two strips of the dots were used in the back and four in the front. Starting at the neck, run the length of the shoulder and continued to the bottom of the sleeve.

Horizontal bands of embroidered net were used on the collar and cuffs. This idea could be applied to any arrangement of tucking, and the dots could be of any desired color.

Free banana pulp from skin and seeds and press enough through a sieve or press to fill a cup; add one cup of granulated sugar, the juice and grated rind of a lemon, and a dash of vanilla.

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Truth and Quality

Small brown. Serve cold with whipped cream. Corn Cakes. One cup of sour milk, one teaspoon of soda dissolved in it, a scant spoon of butter, two great spoons of sugar, one cup of Indian meal and one cup of flour.

Strawberries and Lettuce Salad. Make cups of the white heart leaves of crisp lettuce by crossing the stem ends with a few thin red strawberries in the center of each cup, and dust with powdered sugar. Put a teaspoonful of mayonnaise dressing on a leaf of each cup.

Iron lace and embroidery on the wrong side only. Iron trills, lace, bands, sieves and collars flat.

Leather on writing cases and blotting pads may be sponged with a weak solution of sulphuric acid in water without destroying the delicate ivory tint.

According to a famous palm fencer the leaves of a palm should be washed not with pure water, but milk and water, which has a wonderful way of preserving them and preventing brown spots.

In polishing silver that has been laid away and badly tarnished it is a good plan to dip a portion of a soft old cloth in sweet oil or soft lard, then in whiskey, and rub the articles well until the black has disappeared. Then finish with whiting.

Steel knives that are not in general use may be kept from rusting if they are dipped into a strong solution of soda (one part water to four parts of soda). Then wipe the knives dry, roll them carefully in flannel and put them away in a dry place.

Add a little soda to the water in which you are going to wash greasy dishes. This helps to remove the grease and keeps the dish cloth in good condition.

One quart of water, four lemons, two and a half cups of sugar, one orange. Boil the sugar and water for ten minutes, strain it and add the juice of the lemons and orange; cool and freeze.

One quart of water, two and a half cups of sugar, one and a half cups of strained strawberry juice. Prepare as you did the lemon ice.

Boil three small chickens till tender, adding to taste. When cool, pick fine with fingers; add three stalks of celery, cut fine, and six hard-boiled eggs, sliced. Mix all together thoroughly.
