HONOLULU REPORTS ARE UNFOUNDED

Ann Arbor, Mich., June 13.—Baron Kogoro Takahira, the Japanese ambassador, declared Saturday night that he knew nothing of the reports of a conspiracy among the Japanese in Hawaii to wrest the control of affairs in the islands from the white residents.

PHILIPPINE CONSTABULARY Suddenly Attacked the Quarters at Davao, Where They were Stationed

AMERICANS BESIEGED IN A CHURCH. Whether They Had Fled for Refuge Together with Such of the Natives as Could be Trusted—Mutineers Bombarded the Church for Three Hours—Order Finally Restored by Thirty-Third Infantry.

Manila, June 13.—A portion of the second company of native constabulary, stationed at Davao, in the island of Mindanao, mutinied on the night of June 4 and attacked the company quarters where they were quartered, after wounding one of the native officers.

Mutineers Took to Mountains. After a fight lasting two hours on the following day, in which one man named Loboy was killed, and four others were wounded, the mutineers took to the mountains on the approach of a company of the constabulary stationed at Alad, which hurried to the relief of the besieged Americans and loyal natives.

Suddenly Attacked Quarters. Without any warning to mutineers suddenly attacked the quarters and gained possession.

Americans Besieged in Church. Governor Walker of the Davao province, of which the city of Davao is the capital, immediately rallied the Americans and such natives as could be trusted in a large church and prepared to defend the place.

Attack on the Church. At 5 o'clock of the afternoon of these events the mutineers began an attack on the church. For three hours the constabulary and the American soldiers fought against the church and its defenders.
