BEAN SOUP REMEDY FOR "STEADY DRUNKS." New Jersey Sheriff Has a Sure Cure for Dipomania.

Burlington, N. J., June 14.—The "bean soup" remedy introduced by Sheriff William W. Worrell as one of his economy and reform plans is not only saving Burlington county several hundred dollars monthly but is making more real converts to temperance than any cure yet discovered.

Tramps were the scourge of small cities and towns about the county when Mr. Worrell was elected sheriff. Past conditions at the jail had made it a handy retreat for the idle.

The sheriff a few weeks ago began to apply his new plan to the dipomanics sent up as "steadies." When the tramps deserted the prison, work was lost. In addition, the sheriff prescribed a daily menu of bean soup for all such prisoners.

Protests from some of the prisoners under the unchanging diet of "bean soup" are reaching the outer world. One came to Police Captain Shumard of Burlington. It says in part: "Dear Cap: I am writing to see if you can't get some of my time taken up by the sheriff's bean soup. I can't serve out here. They don't even give us white beans any more. They make a mess of beans and call it bean soup just the same, and nothing but bean soup every day. Damn the beans! I am a sobered man now, and I can't get any more of this bean soup. Let me out I won't come back to beans very soon."

NEW WRIT HABEAS CORPUS GRANTED

By Justice Gaynor of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court—Writ Issued on Application of Thaw's Attorney—Superintendent of Asylum Ordered to Produce Thaw in Court Thursday.

Justice William J. Gaynor of Brooklyn of the appellate division of the supreme court this morning granted writs of habeas corpus this morning, returnable before Justice Mills in the supreme court at White Plains, N. Y., Thursday, June 17, at 10 o'clock.

Returnable Before Justice Mills. The writs were granted on application of Thaw's attorney, Charles A. Morschauer, Thaw's attorney.

Must Produce Thaw Thursday. Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 14.—News reached here tonight that a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Harry K. Thaw had been issued in New York.
