HOME GARMENT MAKING.

GIRL'S ENVELOPE DRESS.

Paris Pattern No. 2929 — All Seams Allowed.

Grass-green linen has been used for the development of this frock, which is made in two pieces, the front and back, the fullness of both distributed in narrow tucks. The band which trims the square neck is simply stitched and the tuck fasteners at the underarm seams with pearl buttons, the belt being held in place by the buttons at the sides. The separate lining is made of green lawn, the figure being in green, matching the frock.

The pattern is in five sizes—4 to 12 years. For a girl of 8 years the dress requires 3 1/2 yards of material 24 inches wide, 2 3/4 yards 27 inches wide, 2 3/4 yards 36 inches wide or 2 yards 27 inches wide; the guimpe needs 1 3/4 yards 36 inches wide, 1 1/2 yards 27 inches wide or 1 1/2 yards 36 inches wide; 2 yards of insertion and 3/4 yard of edging.

LARCHMONT TO BE LOWERED.

Trolley Company's Parlor Car Can Then Pass Under All Bridges.

The New York and Stamford branch of the Connecticut company is to put its private parlor car Larchmont in shape for use on about any branch of the company's lines. There has been a demand for the big car for party use, but in many cases the demand has not been met, because the Larchmont is too high to run beneath some of the railroad bridges. Last week the car was run over to Stamford and was tried beneath the Elm street bridge. It is estimated that the car could have to be lowered about 18 inches. General Manager Potter, Superintendent Young, Master Mechanic J. S. C. Kane and Roadmaster Eric Kennedy of the New York and Stamford division were aboard the car. The Larchmont is fitted up richly, and is an ideal car for private parties. When it was first put on as a special car to Rye Beach, after it was reserved for private parties and official use. Because of the bridges, it has not been used as much as it could have been otherwise. Mr. Potter is going to have the car lowered and put in such shape that it can be used anywhere on the company's system. He says that if it can pass beneath Elm street bridge, Stamford, it can get under any of the others. It is estimated that there will be some little demand for the car as it is fitted up with every convenience of the modern parlor car. It will be used on Friday evening at either end.
