ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NORWICH

PAGE 40, SEC. 4. THE FOLLOWING ACTS ARE DECLARED TO BE ACTS OF NUISANCE OF THE THIRD CLASS: THE PLACING OR CONTINUING ANY ARTICLES OF TRAFFIC OR MERCHANDISE, OR OF ANY WARES, OR ANY CASE OR BOX FOR CONTAINING THE SAME, OR OF ANY PACKING BOXES UPON ANY SIDEWALK OR STREET OR HIGHWAY OF SAID CITY EXCEPT FOR PURPOSES OF TRANSIT OR DELIVERY, AND FOR SUCH TIME, AND IN SUCH MANNER AS SHALL BE REASONABLY NECESSARY FOR SUCH PURPOSES; THE PLACING OR CONTINUING OF ANY POST, RAIL FENCE OR OTHER OBSTRUCTIONS UPON ANY STREET, HIGHWAY OR PUBLIC PLACE OF THE CITY WITHOUT AUTHORITY OF THE STREET COMMISSIONER; THE PLACING OF ANY BUSINESS SIGN WITHIN THE LIMITS OF ANY STREET OF THE CITY OTHERWISE THAN PARALLEL TO AND AGAINST, OR AS NEAR AS IS CONVENIENT TO THE FACE OF THE BUILDING, WALL OR FENCE WHEREUNTO THE SAME SHALL BE ATTACHED WITHOUT PERMISSION OF THE STREET COMMISSIONER.
