250TH ANNIVERSARY JUBILEE BOOK.

THE DEATH OF GEORGE T. BROMLEY.

The news of the death of George T. Bromley was not wholly unexpected. He had been unable to reply to letters for the past two years and grew feebler and feebler until the story of his life in "The Long Ago and Later On," as portrayed by himself, will feel a keener interest than ever in that lively and entertaining story.

He was to have left on the very day on which he saw San Francisco destroyed, and his own home locked up by the flames.

Now the Omaha Bee calls attention to the fact that Canada is being benefited in the same way. "The intrinsic value of a protective tariff is conclusively shown," says The Bee, "in a Canadian consular report just made public, showing that \$200,000,000 of American capital is invested in Canada by manufacturers who also have plants in this country.
