

# WESTERLY DISTRICT NURSE

### Makes Report of Practical Service During Past Month—Sale of Nichols & Langworthy Bonds Postponed—Marist Fathers Occupy Summer Home—Coast Artillery Corps Coming Today.

Rev. Peter McCoscar, for the past three years pastor of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Westerly, is still on his second novitiate at the Marist headquarters in Washington, D. C. When the Marist order assumed charge of the Westerly church Father McCoscar was assigned as pastor and succeeded in substantial upbuilding of the parish.

It is the unanimous desire of the parishioners that Father McCoscar return and effort is being made to bring about that result, although it is the general rule of the Marist fathers to limit a single pastorate to three years.

At present Rev. John Dunn, one of the former curates, is in temporary charge of the parish, and he has been assisted by Rev. Fathers Hagerly and Thomas. The Marist home on the Watch Hill road, formerly known as the Marvin place, and purchased as a retreat for the Marist order about a year ago, is occupied this season, three or four of the priests being there at a time, and one or more of these visitors assist Father Dunn in church work on Sundays.
