GAY YOUNG CUBAN FOILED IN LOVE

Juan Balsinde, After Following Actress from Place to Place, Commits Suicide in New York

New York, July 15.—Suicide ended the gay career of a wealthy young Cuban today, when Juan Balsinde shot himself in his apartment at 211 East Fourteenth street. Nearly 200 seat checks from Cuban theaters, some memoranda and a letter indicated that he had been infatuated with an actress and had followed her from place to place in Cuba and in this country. He killed himself, it is believed, because his money had given out and his love affair had lost its interest.

Was 26 Years Old. Balsinde, who was 26 years old, had been attending a school at Poughkeepsie. He returned to this country from Cuba several months ago, following the company in which the actress was playing. Last night he went to the Hotel America, where he had formerly resided. He returned to his rooms, and this morning his landlady was awakened by a shot. Running to his bedroom, she found Balsinde, fully dressed, lying on the floor, a bullet wound in his right side and a revolver lying near by. He died shortly after at Bellevue hospital.

Letter Found in His Room. A letter, dated July 2, found in his room, was addressed "Dear Louise." The letter said in part: "I am going away soon. I have had enough trouble with my people already."

I am going back to Cuba to my mother, who will forgive me for all my foolish acts.

I will be the same aristocratic young gentleman I was when I left Havana a year ago with the foolish purpose to follow an actress girl. Remember, I said I came here to New York to see a friend, and you have tried to stop my friendship toward that one. You tell me she does not love me, but is only after my money. That is not so, for she is a good girl, and works. It is you that has been after my money. I am her, and will see her when I come back. Good-by.

Parents Are Wealthy. The clerk at the Hotel America told the police that Balsinde's parents were wealthy, that his father was a member of the firm of Balsinde Brothers, owners of extensive sugar plantations. Among the memoranda in the youth's room were notes showing that his expenses from June 19 to July 4 had been \$448. A letter, apparently written by his mother, said that no more money would be sent him unless he returned to his school at Poughkeepsie. The police said they had learned that about a week ago Balsinde cabled to his parents for money but none had been forthcoming. No money was found among his effects.

IN THREE TOWNS. Winsted Farmer Claims Damages for Killing of Sheep.

Burr Beecher, farmer, who lives in three towns at once, his residence being in Winchester, Goshen and Norfolk, had a flock of 48 sheep attacked by dogs the other day. Two of the sheep were killed, others were badly bitten and a number are still missing. The dogs which did the killing were shot to death. They were owned by a poor Norfolk man. Beecher called upon the town to settle, claiming the sheep were in Winchester when killed or wounded.

CONNECTICUT CONTRACTS.

Uncle Sam Evidently Appreciates Yankee Products.

Connecticut concerns are landing some good government contracts these days. They are doing business on a large scale with the war and navy departments. The Colt Patent Firearms company of Hartford is making deliveries of machine guns for the army under a large contract made last summer. To the Colt company has been awarded a contract for supplying 100 45-caliber revolvers to the navy at \$15 each.

The navy department is about to execute a contract with the American and British Manufacturing company of Bridgeport for a large number of three-inch guns for landing parties of bluejackets which will cost about \$190,000. To the same concern has just been awarded a contract for a six-pounder Hotchkiss semi-automatic rapid fire gun for the revenue cutter Morrill, stationed at Detroit, to cost \$2,500.

It is expected that either the Colt concern or the American and British company, or perhaps both, will soon receive a contract or contracts for automatic guns for the army, for which Congress appropriated about \$200,000 last winter. The army has adopted the Hotchkiss type of gun, which is covered by French patents.

The government recently contracted for some of these guns with a Paris firm. It is understood, however, that Connecticut manufacturers have recently acquired the right to exploit the French patents in this country, and they are expected to make most of the Hotchkiss guns hereafter. Some are now being made at the Springfield armory.

New Rector for Bridgeport. The successor to the Rev. E. Livingston Wells, who accepted a call to Christ church, Guilford, on July 1, has been appointed by Bishop Brewster of the Episcopal diocese of Connecticut. The Rev. John C. France, who has had charge of St. Paul's church in Huntington, will become rector of St. Luke's church at Bridgeport. Mr. France is a southerner, being a native of Tennessee.

OLD BOOK STORE.

To Leave—Fine Location in Waterbury.

"The Book Haunt," one of the best known places of business in Waterbury and for many years conducted by George N. Ellis, will become a part of Waterbury history in February, 1910, when the place of business at 44 Bank street will be occupied by Louis and Joseph Suganhetner of New Haven, who will conduct there a millinery emporium. "The Book Haunt," which is at present run by the George N. Ellis company, will either go out of business or secure quarters in some other location in the city, according to The Waterbury American.

"The Book Haunt" was the first book store to be opened in the city of Waterbury, the first proprietor being William Patton, a character closely linked with Waterbury history in the '40s and '50s. Mr. Patton came to Waterbury to work at the trade of button chasing. His love for reading and literature finally persuaded him to leave the factory, and in 1842 he

opened a small store. In 1848 he located in the old Lybeam building and connected a book bindery with his store. In 1852 the store was removed to the Arcade and in 1859 to the Hotchkiss block.

Shortly afterward the store was removed to the present Ellis building on Bank street, where the business was carried on by Mr. Patton until 1883. In that year it was sold to George N. Ellis, who conducted the Haunt under his name until his death a few years ago. The George N. Ellis company was then organized and the business has been carried on under its management since the death of Mr. Ellis.




