LADIES' ONE-PIECE CORSET COVER. Paris Pattern No. 2304 - All Seams Allowed.

This pretty little design is especially desirable for wide flouncing, but if desired it may be developed in Persian lawn, nainsook, jaconet or thin cambric, with the lower edge gathered into a pleatum at the back and at either side of the front, and made with or without shield sleeves. If made of the flouncing these sleeves and the pleatum are not used.

The pattern is in six sizes—32 to 42 inches, bust measure. For 36 bust the correct cover, as in front view, requires 1 1/2 yards of flouncing 15 inches wide; if shield sleeves and pleatum are to be used, 1/2 yard of material 36 inches wide will be needed for them; 1 yard of wide heading, 1 1/2 yards of seam heading, 2 yards of wide ribbon, 2 1/2 yards of narrow ribbon and 1 1/2 yards of edging will also be needed.
