The game was a double match in which Little and Larned trimmed the Philadelphia pair, Clothier, former national champion, and Johnson, in five sets.

FINANCIAL COMMERCIAL.

SLUGGISH, TORPID MARKET. Speculators in Waiting Mood—U. S. Steel Steady and Quiet.

New York, July 23.—The sluggish and torpid state of the stock market today was significant of a waiting mood on the part of the speculation. The event waited with most interest at present undoubtedly is the meeting of the United States Steel directors on next Tuesday to act on the quarterly dividend. Speculative opinion has about reconciled itself to the view that there will be no change in the dividend rate at that time. There was less fear today that the market would be attended by active selling of the stock and a decline in the quotation. United States Steel was steady and quiet today, and conveyed the assurance by holding its price at 73, which had been inserted again at above 70, which had been withdrawn successively at 71 on the downward course from the maximum price of 75, which was touched last Saturday. A hopeful feeling was imparted to speculative holdings of the United States Steel by the action of Amalgamated Copper. The rise in this stock which is paying a dividend at the rate of 2 per cent, to above 81 caused it to be cited as evidence of what could be done with the price of an industrial security paying 2 per cent, and with prospects. The recent 1-2 per cent quarterly dividend on Amalgamated Copper had been preceded by rumors of an intended increase. The immediate influence in the rise of Amalgamated Copper today was the active market at advancing prices for copper warrants in the London market. This gives rise to hope that the accumulation of copper stocks in second hands in Europe may be in process of absorption. The exports of copper from the United States, however, fell during the past week to less than half of the total for the preceding week. The rise in the price of warrants in London was accompanied by the marking up of the bid price at the metal exchange in New York. There were reports that one of the large producers was taking no more orders for delivery beyond October, in the confidence that prices will be higher by that time. Crop news was mainly favorable, with the exception of some reports of hot winds that might cause deterioration in the corn crop. This did not prevent a rise in Rock Island, classed as one of the principal corn carriers. The strength of occasional stocks in the list and, even more, the renewed support accorded United States Steel was effective in holding the general market. Estimates of the week's currency movement indicated a larger inflow from the interior exchanges on New York. The sub-treasury operations also have yielded a small amount to the banks. The loss of nearly \$2,000,000 by the week's gold exports to South America promises to be made up sufficiently to leave an indicated net loss in bank cash of but little over a million dollars.
