

TOWN OF WESTERLY TO BE SUED

Miss States, of Stonington, Will Claim \$10,000 Damages—British Club Still in Disension—Rounding Up Pawcatuck Bad Boys—Suit Against North Stonington Woman—Honest Laborer Finds Fat Wallet and Gets Thanked.

There was a meeting called for Wednesday evening for the consideration of the suit brought by the firm of Dixon & Rathbun, for Charles D. Chapman, vice president and steward of the British club, who seeks to recover for salary as steward alleged to be due, in which damages are fixed at \$1,000. The bank account with the Industrial Trust company is tied up by attachment. By arrangement with the sheriff, the club rooms have not been closed, but the club has been permitted to continue in business, without interruption by the attachment, and the receipts are to be turned over to the sheriff Saturday.

There was a large attendance at the meeting, Wednesday evening. It was past two o'clock Thursday morning before adjournment was reached. It was a lively session, but no definite arrangement was reached, and a natural result was curbside meetings of small groups of members all over the town Thursday. There was a rumor that some of the officers and members of the club were to resign, and that there was probability that

notice to quit the premises would soon be served. The apparent trouble is over the salary alleged to be due the steward, \$14 a week, and claim made that the steward's position was a labor of love and not of pecuniary recompense. The organization has a membership of over 300, doing a business of from \$7,000 to \$8,000 a year.

Just over the river from Westerly, in the village of Pawcatuck, there has been much trouble of late by the unlawful action of boys and young men and the police authorities are endeavoring to check the growing evil. Recently a boy of eighteen, ringleader of a gang, was arrested and fined for a breach of the peace, but that did not seem to have much effect upon the boys from ten to fourteen, whose inclinations are to follow in the unlawful wake of the older boys.

Some of the little fellows forced entrance into the barn of Cilla Constantino in Liberty street, and complaint was made to Constable John E. McMahon. Soon thereafter he had the guilty boys in custody. There were two young men, a lad named Hoffman, another named Casella, and another Buck. The boys helped themselves to fruit that was stored in the barn. Thursday morning the boys were arraigned before Judge Albert E. Stillman, found guilty, ordered to pay the costs and placed on probation until October 1, with orders to report to Probation Officer Hurdick in Pawcatuck, every Monday evening.

On Monday, Oct. 10th inst., while Miss States, sister of C. S. States, formerly general ticket agent of the Compollated railroad, was driving a horse with carriage containing herself and two nieces, she claims she was seriously injured by reason of a defective highway.

It is claimed that by reason of this alleged defect, which is at the corner of Pleasant and West streets, the wheels of the carriage caught in the trolley tracks, and the vehicle was overturned, throwing the occupants out. Miss States was severely and seriously injured; her nieces escaped with lesser injury. Her left collarbone and three ribs were broken, a part of her left ear torn away, and she was otherwise cut and bruised. Notice of the suit will be served within a few days.

NORWICH GETS CONTRACT.

Pratt & Whitney Company to Erect a Factory for Australians.

In competition with the foremost plants in Great Britain and in the face of a strong spirit of loyalty to the mother country industries, the Pratt & Whitney company of Hartford has succeeded in winning the contract to erect a small armory factory for the Australian government. Official notices have been sent forth from the Commonwealth government at Australia announcing the award of the contract for the work, and in the Australian parliament Joseph Cook, minister of defense, has explained in detail the reasons for the award in the face of a number of bids from British competing firms.

Not only the extremely low price bid by the Hartford firm, but the short time allowance for executing the contract were taken into consideration, but even more than both of these considerations is the belief that the British rifle factories are twenty years behind the modern continental arsenals and that the American firm can equip with more modern manufacturing facilities than the British.

It is said that the British firms were hopelessly outclassed in the bidding. Pratt & Whitney offering to execute the contract for \$340,000, as against a bid of \$600,000 from one of the nearest British competitors.

MILK MEN FOUND GUILTY.

Costly for Them to Have Registered Bottles of Another.

The six milkmen who were notified to appear in the Hartford police court to answer to the charge of having milk bottles in their possession which had been registered by P. H. Christie were found guilty by Judge Edward L. Steele in the session of the court Tuesday morning. The costs against each milkman amounted to \$20.57 and a fine of 10 cents was imposed on each for each bottle found in his possession that had Christie's registration.

How Money Grows.

Fifty-six years ago a Meriden woman started a bank account with the Meriden Savings bank, and on Jan. 1, 1853, she deposited \$10. In November of the same year she put in \$1.50. Her next deposit was in December, 1875, \$30; in 1881 she laid \$7 aside, and her last deposit was \$5 which was in 1882. On July 16 last the bank account was closed and the book showed that she had \$323.82 coming to her. The total amount of deposits was \$52.50 and the interest was \$376.32.

Janitor Forty-Five Years.

This month marks the completion of Harlow F. Raymond's forty-fifth year as janitor at Wesleyan university, Middletown. Mr. Raymond will celebrate his 80th birthday in September and is at work every day around the college. At present he is superintending the repairs on the college buildings.

The Hartford postoffice now has 192 employees, which is the largest number in its history. They are divided as follows: Regular carriers 70, substitute carriers 21, regular clerks 68, substitute clerks 6, laborers 2, special delivery boys 2, clerks in charge of stations 23.
