

THAW'S CONDUCT AT MATEWAN

Described by Dr. Amos B. Baker, First Assistant Surgeon of that Asylum

INSOLENT AND DOMINEERING PATIENT

First Statements Upon Reaching Institution were Expressions of Amusement Over Clever Work of His Lawyers and Alienists—Quarreled with Other Patients—Silly and Pompous.

White Plains, N. Y., Aug. 2.—How Harry K. Thaw conducted himself at the Matteawan asylum for the criminal insane, a phase of his life not gone into before, was described today by Dr. Amos B. Baker, first assistant physician of the institution, the only witness called by District Attorney Jerome at the continuation of the hearing by which Thaw hopes to obtain his release. The examination of Dr. Baker had no effect upon the patient, who was taken. Aside from his testimony a two-foot stack of canvas bound books labeled "The People vs. Harry K. Thaw" records of the murder trial furnished all the evidence introduced by Mr. Jerome today.

He expects to be through with the state alienists tomorrow, when Charles Morschauer, Thaw's lawyer, will put his client on the stand, possibly late in the afternoon. Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw, as she sat in court today, saw Mr. Jerome introduce against her son testimony which she willingly gives heretofore to save his life. Today it was seized upon by the state to prove him insane. It included her accounts of his nervous temperament as a child, material valuable to Thaw when he was in danger of the electric chair, but now meaning to his hope of proving himself sane man. One thing quoted by the district attorney was her statement concerning Harry Thaw from the time he was a boy to his head and before after the measles he had St. Vitus' dance.

Notes Describing Thaw's Acts. Dr. Baker's testimony was read by himself from his case books and described Thaw's conduct, both normal and queer, on many occasions from Feb. 1, 1908, to the date of his commitment, until June 25 of the present year. Though some of these notes described the patient as "silly" and "pompous" the witness said that in his belief Thaw was "irrational" now. Thaw's attorney made his first statement during the first three months of the patient's stay at Matteawan he observed no signs of paranoia. After that Thaw, by his conduct, manifested melancholia, the effect of a nervous breakdown, previously had made an unsuccessful attempt to kill his mother by jumping into the sea when the Vanderland was at Dover.

He called from New York July 24 and throughout his strange actions were the subject of comment by the saloon passengers, among whom was former Governor Bennett, who was in New York. When the Vanderland put into Dover, Mr. Brown suddenly mounted the railing of the steamer and leaped into the sea. Passengers shouted an alarm, however, the small boats were manned and Mr. Brown rescued. He was immediately placed in his cabin and thereafter was under the care of the ship's doctor. For a moment today half an hour before the steamer started at Antwerp he was off alone, and seizing a knife, slashed his throat and died soon afterward. The tragedy caused deep gloom among his fellow passengers.

The passenger list of the steamer Vanderland gives the name C. H. Brown as a first cabin passenger, but records no Charles Brown. Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 2.—Charles H. Brown was manager of the State post vaults connected with the Marine bank of this city for nearly twenty years. About a month ago his mother died. She had been invalid for many years and he had been greatly devoted to her. His own health has been poor for some time and the bank granted him a vacation.

PHILIPPINE TARIFF BILL. Conference Report Agreed to by House—Other Measures Passed. Washington, Aug. 2.—The conference report on the Philippine tariff bill was agreed to by the house today. The measure is supplementary to the Payne tariff bill and is intended to provide enough additional revenue to make up the amount which will be lost to the Philippine government by the enactment of the provisions for free trade between the United States and the Philippine Islands.

A bill granting a franchise for the construction of a canal across the Savannah river was passed. The remainder of the session was taken up with a discussion of the urgent deficiency appropriation bill as amended by the senate. One of the amendments provided for carriages for the vice president and the speaker, and all of them were disagreed to. The house at 2.28 p. m. adjourned until noon tomorrow.

MILK SUPPLY THREATENED. New York, New Jersey and New England Affected by Drouth. New York, Aug. 2.—Unless there is a good rain within a few days, milk prices in this city will advance a figure not reached in years, according to dairymen who have been hit by the drouth. New York, New Jersey and most of New England are affected. Dealers are hoarding their daily supply as best they can to meet demands and on August 3 a meeting will be held to discuss the situation. If relief is not forthcoming soon, the retail price of milk will probably be raised at that time. The wholesale price of milk has risen from 17 1/2 and 18 1/2 to 23 and 24 a can in the last week or so.

From his note book he told of various incidents, including Thaw's refusal to accept mail addressed to him, his refusal to see his wife until told by Mr. Morschauer had sent her, and his "insolent and domineering" actions to the physicians and attendants.
