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WILLIMANTIC Contractor Gets Irritated Over Conditions During Main Street Improvements.

There was plenty of harmless excitement and loose conversation on Main street Friday afternoon, where the tracks are being torn up for the relaying of heavier iron and work is in progress paving the street. Mayor Dunn advanced along and noticed that the trolley men were tampering with the tracks and work is in progress paving the street. He told them that they would have to remedy the defect. Contractor Langfeld, who has the paving job, was dissatisfied with the way things were going, and told his men to quit for the day. His laborers are entirely separate from those doing the track work. THIRTEEN DEATHS. Recorded in Putnam During the Past Month. The monthly bulletin issued by the state board of health for August contains the following statistics relative to Putnam: Living births in July 19, marriages in July 8. Jewett is also representing an annual death rate per thousand of 19.2; deaths under one year 6, deaths from one to five years 2, deaths under five years 2.8. The deaths resulted from the following causes: Whooping cough 1, diphtheria under five years 3, consumption 1, diseases of the nervous system 1, accidents and violence 1, all other diseases 6.
