The Stonington team came to Westerly Saturday afternoon with three new men selected upon the reputation of being high class players. The Westerly team went in to do their very best to win, not allowing the Stoningtons to score a single run in either of the two games, or even to permit a player to get beyond second base.

White Rock went down to Carolina to play a double header and made an even split, in well played games. In the first contest when Reiser hit the ball to McSheffrey, who fumbled and Reiser reached third, Devin's single over second sent Reiser home.

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Stanley F. Sturtevant, formerly telegraph operator at the Noank railroad station and later assistant station agent at the Warren station, died on Saturday of cerebro spinal meningitis at the Rhode Island state hospital, city of North Providence. He was thirty years of age, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy W. Sturtevant of New Haven, Vt., where he was born and was graduated from the high school. Besides his parents he leaves a sister and a brother. The body will be taken to New Haven for burial.
