

The Circulation of The Bulletin.

The Bulletin has the largest circulation of any paper in Eastern Connecticut, and from three to four times larger than that of any in Norwich. It is delivered to over 3,000 of the 4,651 houses in Norwich and read by ninety-three per cent of the people. In Windham it is delivered to over 500 houses, in Putnam and Danvers to over 1,100, and in all of these places it is considered the local daily.

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Cleaning Plaster of Paris.

HOME GARMENT MAKING.

Paris Transfer Pattern No. 8099. Designs for the end of a towel to be transferred to huckaback and embroidered solidly or partly in eyes, and partly solid as preferred. The scallops are buttonholed closely and the stems are outlined. Price of pattern, 10 cents.

Meat or Potato Croquettes.

Two cups of meat or potato, chopped fine, one tablespoon of butter, two tablespoons of flour, a little salt; mix together, then dip in egg and rolled in bread crumbs. Fry in hot fat.

Tomato Soup.

One can of tomatoes, or one quart of fresh tomatoes sliced and boiled in three pints of water one and a half hours and strained, one tablespoon of butter dissolved in water and stirred in, butter the size of an egg, one pint of milk (which has been scalded) and just before it is ready for the table, a little pinch of soda improves it.

DELICIOUS MINT JELLY.

Mint Jelly—a jelly of a delicate green and delicious with roast lamb—is not difficult to make. One who has had success with it gives directions as follows: "Crabapple—the light-colored kind should be selected—are the foundation. I cook these until they are very soft, and let them strain through a cloth bag over night. In the morning I measure the liquor, and to every pint of juice I put an equal quantity of sugar. Put all in a large boiler and boil to hard boil, adding when it begins to boil, a dozen sprays of mint to every pint of juice. This mint I first tie up in a cheesecloth bag. When the juice of the mint has boiled for 15 minutes I take out the mint and add the sugar, which has been heated in the oven. After the sugar is added the mixture should boil until it gels, usually about five minutes. Then I add a little harmless green coloring matter, a minute amount, to suggest mint, as the mint leaves will not lend a prettily attractive to the eye."

Lobster Newburg.

Take the meat from two medium-sized lobsters and cut into cubes. Add a tablespoon of butter, but a teaspoonful of salt, and a quarter of a teaspoonful of red pepper and let all simmer well. Add half a pint of cream and cook until tender. When thoroughly cooked add half a teaspoonful of nutmeg, two wineglassfuls of rich sherry and stir in quickly the yolks of three eggs well beaten. Cook five minutes or more. Then serve at once.
