## Lodge Notes and Fraternal Interests

**Noble Grand Invites Rebekahs—Grand Officers Visit Egyptians—Knights of Columbus Ready to Parade—Pythian Sisters will Entertain Delegates.**

### ORDER OF PROTECTION.

Thames lodge, No. 326, held a well attended meeting on Tuesday evening in Forester's hall and owing to the absence of both the warden and vice warden, Brother Daniel J. Johnston was appointed warden pro tem. He carried out the ritual work in a manner pleasing to those present and conducted the business of the meeting with promptness and despatch.  
Grand Warden F. H. Tolles of Windsor was present to pay this lodge an official visit and was accompanied by Grand Guide Joseph Watt of Jewett City, Grand Trustee E. M. Newbury of this city, Deputy Grand Warden E. R. Kingston and Deputy William Kingston of New London, also Brother A. H. Doss of Charter Oak lodge of New Haven.  
The grand warden in his remarks to the members told of the great work being done by the lodges throughout the six New England states and particularly of that done in Connecticut. He has visited many lodges in the past month and was much pleased with the work being done and planned for the near future.  
He also took occasion to urge the members to work for the prizes offered by the grand and supreme lodges to those bringing in new members. A handsome gold watch is offered for the first prize and a solid gold charm or locket for the second prize. Also any member securing ten members will be presented with a handsome set of dishes decorated with the emblem of the order, and gold badges or pins for those securing from one to five new members.

Grand Guide Watt and Deputy E. R. Kingston told of the work done in Essex lodge, No. 484, at 64 that Thames lodge would have to show some of the old time hustle if they wished to hold the place gained in the past few years.  
Deputy William Kingston said that in New London the order was making great gains. A short time ago Higgins lodge was organized there and the members of Beulah lodge are determined that they will not be outdone. At this point he had organized two teams, under the warden and vice warden and the team securing the greatest number of applicants will be served with a dinner by the other.  
Thames lodge is planning an enjoyable event in the form of a children's night, early in November, and Chairman M. J. Curran and the committee promise the members something out of the ordinary.

### SONS OF HERMANN.

Germania lodge, No. 11, met in regular form Thursday evening in Germania hall. In addition to the usual business attention was called to the present issue of the state paper in which the growth of the order is shown in the past four years to have been very encouraging. In that time it has been established in fifty more states of the union with 14 lodges and 532 members and about \$167,400 capital. It now has lodges numbering 53 in 34 states, which have a total capital of \$594,456.69 and 39,093 members.  
The paper also contains a vigorous letter from Secretary August Hahn of Germania lodge, in which he demonstrates to the Connecticut members the value their paper can be and calls upon all the secretaries to be more diligent about contributing to it the lodge news from the different places.
