COACHING PARTY IN WESTERY

Welcomed by Large Assemblage in Dixon Square—Supreme Court Decision for Miss Eabcock—Bailey-Lowe Wedding—Sunday Evening—Serious Mishap to Locomotive—Baseball.

Train No. 281, accommodation from Providence to New London, due to leave Westery at 5:15 in the afternoon, was held up by serious accident to the locomotive, but fortunately without damage to trainmen or passengers.

The engine, in charge of Conductor Manuel Joseph, left Westery twelve minutes late Saturday evening and was going at high speed towards Stonington when the engine became disabled.

The crankpin on Ft.eman W. C. Woodburn's side of the locomotive broke and the powerful machine practically "stripped" itself. The back connecting rod on the left side dropped from the rear wheel axle and was twisted into U shape, and the connecting rod on the right side broke about midway and the part attached to the rear wheel swung around as the wheel revolved and made kindling wood of the section of the cab directly under the seat of Engineer Thomas Dwyer, leaving only the bare board part of the seat upon which the engineer was sitting.

Passengers were thrown from their seats at the first shock and then for a distance of at least six hundred feet the train slid or rather bounded along at reduced speed until Engineer Dwyer was able to bring the locomotive to a standstill. Almost every connection on the locomotive was enveloped in it, the escaping steam.

The engineer and fireman, although surrounded by flying steam and in the midst of flying bits of machinery, stuck to their posts until the train was brought to a safe standstill. Soon after the mishap the Colonial eastbound express came along and stopped in response to signal by Conductor Joseph, who boarded the train and returned to Westery, from where he telegraphed the report of the mishap to the proper officials. A light engine was sent from Midway station to the train, and this was accomplished without delay to traffic in any inconvenient extent.

Through the courtesy of Trainman George Godfrey, the passengers were escorted down the tracks and up the steep banks to the trolley tracks, where they took passage for New London and intermediate stations on the Groton-Stonington road.

The hand fire engine Hav Cart of Pawtucket, formerly Rhode Island One, was the victor in the contest in the big contest at the firemen's muster at Brockton in the list of fifty-three contestants for squaring honors and prizes, but failed to force even a spray of water beyond 175 feet 4 1/2 inches. The Hancock engine of Brockton took first prize with a water record of 232 feet. The Fire King of Pawtucket led the Rhode Island contingent, finishing seventh in the list with a range of 147 feet.

There was a large assemblage in Dixon square during the noon hour Saturday to welcome Alfred G. Vanderbilt and party of the New York Coaching club en route from New York to Newport where the horse and carriage party was scheduled to arrive at 12:15 and at that hour Mr. Wilson, who preceded the party in an automobile, met the party at the station in readiness in front of the stable of James A. Welch. At just 12:20, five minutes behind the schedule, the coaching party entered Westery, driving over the Pawtucket river bridge, and halted up for the change of horses.

While the horses were being changed Mr. Vanderbilt stood near the horses in pleasant conversation with Mr. Newport, who had been at the party, driving his own horse and taking the prominent place on the driver's seat by reason of that fact.
