Criminal Term Opens on Tuesday—Judge Robinson Presiding—Much Business Disposed Of.

At 10 o'clock Tuesday morning the October criminal term of the superior court was opened in the courtroom of this city with Judge Robinson on the bench.

Previous to taking up the criminal business, Attorney Hull of New London asked the court to take the case of Deasy A. Wilcox vs. E. A. Card.

The case was assigned as a second case for Wednesday, before a jury, of the list for the present.

Attorney Perkins of Norwich, who represented the plaintiff, objected, Judge Robinson ordered the case taken from the list for the time being.

Jail Sentence for Pomfret Couple. Criminal business was then taken up. Willis D. Lambert and Julia A. Moore, both colored, of Pomfret, were called.

Attorney Harry H. Back was assigned. The charge against them was adultery.

Following consultation with counsel, both pleaded guilty. State Attorney Seale and Attorney Back made statements to the court relating to the case and the former directed a divorce and the latter a permanent alimony.

Mrs. Moore was married twelve years ago to George Moore of Eastford. He was turned half-witted and she did not live with him.

She went to Pomfret nine years ago and has lived with Lambert ever since and they have had three children and have supported them.

Attorney Seale said that the woman should get a divorce and protect her children. Her real husband has never contributed to her support since marriage.

Attorney Seale said that the case against Charles Loomis of Andover, who was placed on probation in December, was assigned.
