SOLWAY MILL FOR WESTERY

Possibility that Department of Industry May Return—Weddings—\$1,250 Equist Paid Methodist Church—Burial of E. Church—Republican Club to Dine.

There was a report in Westery on Tuesday that a branch of the Solway mills of Ingrahamville, near Pawtucket, was to be established in Westery. In the building in Main street abandoned by the Solway people three years ago, when they moved from here to the big, new and modern plant at the company in Ingrahamville, the local buildings have been unoccupied ever since. The Solway company was loth to leave Westery, but the condition here in regard to securing the property desired and some minor obstructions caused the removal. As regards employees and the Main street mill, for a limited business, there was no fault to be found by the company, and therefore credence is given to the report. It is said that a certain part of the mill can be done to advantage in Westery and that therefore there is a likelihood of a partial return of the business.

The owners of the mill building are offering the property at a reasonable rental and no hindrance to adding to the Westery industries can be ascribed to excessive rental. The Solway Mills company is a known quantity in Westery, and its return home even in part would receive the hearty welcome and encouragement of the town. It is definitely known that if the owners of the Main street mill will install a new boiler and engine and put the building in proper repair, the Solway Mills company will lease the building, install looms and begin operations again in Westery.

left for New York on the 7.33 train, and upon their return will reside at 15 Stanton street, where they have a fully furnished home. The bride received \$100. Mr. Brown has been employed as clerk in the store of E. Howard Clark for the past eleven years.

Judge Edward M. Burke held regular session of the Westery probate court Tuesday afternoon. In the estate of Verden Barber testimony was given by William A. Wilcox, real estate expert, that the land of the estate in Rockinton was valued at \$600. The administrator was authorized to sell the same at private sale for not less than \$600, or at public auction. Bond was fixed at \$900.

Mary A. Graft was appointed administrator of the estate of Joseph Graft, whose personal estate will not exceed \$1,300. The bonds were fixed at \$1,300. Appraisers appointed an Edward Vose, Martin H. Spellman and Oliver E. Gavitt.

The first and final account of the Washington Trust company, through Austin L. Perry, treasurer, upon the estate of Mary J. Pearce, was received and allowed and ordered to be recorded. The report included the payment of a legacy of \$1,250 to the Methodist Episcopal church.

The estate of Sarah C. Gallagher, of the Washington Trust company, administrator de bonis non, was authorized to pay to Mr. and Mrs. Raymond E. Fodge the sum of \$27,571, the distributive share of the estate due to Margaret M. McCray, their adopted daughter, now known as Daisy M. Fodge.

Harriet M. Greene, administratrix of the estate of Emma F. Holdredge, submitted her first and final account, which was allowed and ordered recorded. The report showed a balance of \$301.02, and the administratrix asked for an order of distribution. Edward Greene and Harriet M. Greene, brother and sister of deceased, and eight children of Mary Greene-Brown, nephews and nieces of deceased, and grandchildren of the deceased, were present. The distribution gives to Miss and Mr. Greene \$37.67 each, and \$33.65 to the nine children, or \$374 each, two of them receiving an extra cent.

Michael E. Hanaty, administrator of the estate of John Lynch, reported to the court of probate that no personal property of the deceased had been discovered. The report was received and ordered recorded.
