

MOTHERS' DAY AT THE REVIVAL

Special Observance this afternoon with all Wearing a White Flower—Rev. F. M. Ramsdell of New Bedford Heard Thursday Afternoon and Evening and Henry E. Washburn in the Afternoon—Dr. Stough will Return unday.

Bible conference day in the union evangelistic campaign began on Thursday with a meeting at the armory at 10 a. m., when Rev. Dr. West, chairman of the executive committee, was in charge. Mr. Spooner led the song service and prayer was offered by Rev. C. H. Peck of Hanover. A quiet hour was spent in prayer with brief remarks by Dr. West and prayers by Rev. Mr. Ricketts, Rev. Dr. Kaufman and others.

Rev. Elliot F. Talmadge of Wareham, was the first speaker. He spoke with great appreciation of a short visit of four days that Dr. Stough made to the churches of the New Bedford area, during which there were seventeen conversions. He also spoke with sympathy of Dr. Stough's sorrow in the loss of his son.

After the solo, Peace, Wonderful Peace, rendered in Mr. Herring's usual faultless manner, Rev. Clarence M. Gallup of the First Baptist church, New Bedford, Mass., was presented for the first address by Rev. Mr. Cunningham. His topic was to be the Value of a Revival to a Church, referring particularly to the experience of the New Bedford churches, where Dr. Stough and his associates conducted a remarkable revival last winter.

Rev. Mr. Gallup testified to the great uplift to the churches the revival in New Bedford had been and urged that the revivalists here longer, building a structure for the meetings if necessary when the armory can no longer be had. The right atmosphere and the right spirit must be found in the churches to enjoy the spiritual blessing, and he believed that these meetings would be more successful the longer they are held.

After a few remarks by Rev. Mr. Cunningham, the meeting closed with a hymn and the closing prayer by Rev. Brewer Boardman of Waterford.

The afternoon meeting began shortly after 2 o'clock and continued until 4, with a fair number attending. It began with a praise and testimony service conducted by Mr. Spooner. The first speaker was Henry E. Washburn of Boston, who was introduced by Rev. Mr. Cunningham to speak upon "Observations of the Greater Boston Revival and the Cambridge Group in Particular."

Mr. Washburn is a member of a Cambridge church. His observations were summed up in his suggestion that everybody should be workers and active in extending the invitation to attend the armory meetings so that the reach and scope of the revival effort might be extended. Out of this campaign, he said, would come just what the individual Christians wanted.

Rev. Mr. Cunningham commended this suggestion from Mr. Washburn, saying that he was surprised at the numbers of people who were still in the net of class far attendance at the armory went. He urged that Mr. Washburn's suggestion be acted upon.
