Chicago, Oct. 31.—Two bombs were exploded tonight in downtown buildings occupied by gambling clubs. The first bomb was the thirty-second and thirty-third that have been hurled in gambling establishments within the last two years. No one was injured, but many windows were broken and store stocks were damaged.

Plate Glass Windows Blown Out. The first bomb exploded soon after 6 o'clock in a building at 100 state street and the other followed fifteen minutes later in a building near La Salle and Madison streets. In the State street building the bomb exploded in an adjacent gambling organization, has its quarters, while the building at Madison and La Salle street houses the "Worth Jockey club, which keeps a handbook on horse races. The acts are said to be due to a quarrel between syndicates of gamblers who operate in violation of the law.

No Arrests Made. The police, after investigating the circumstances, found that the first bomb was set off apparently in the upper floor of the building occupied by the Empire club, formerly managed by "Social" Smith and "Harry" Perry. A second explosion there a year ago had exploded there, but the police had last July since the interpretation of Perry sold out to a syndicate which began operations only a few days ago.

New Haven, Oct. 31.—It is stated semi-officially that the Sheffield scientific school, the second largest department of Yale university, favors the abrogation of the rule which compels a candidate for admission to pass his preliminary examination in at least five subjects or otherwise repeat his work.

Kept Alive by Artificial Respiration. Only the immediate resort to artificial respiration kept the boy from almost instant death, for he did not draw a natural breath after receiving the fatal shock. Surgeons were unable to make a complete examination last night on account of his critical condition and opinions varied as to whether a blow on the spine or on the head had been the cause of his death. But X-ray photographs taken after his death revealed a dislocation between the first vertebrae to be thrown forward in the neck, and probably resulting in a lesion in those nerve centers of the medulla oblongata which govern the respiratory muscles.

Funeral Services Today. Funeral services will be held tomorrow in the Catholic chapel at the north end of the post, where the body was taken this afternoon. A cadet guard has been posted at the chapel and details of young soldiers will watch over the body until after the services tomorrow.
