Abraham Gluskin, who until recently conducted a shoe store on Union street in this city, when a number of attachments were placed on the store, Monday, through his attorney, Thomas J. Kelley, filed with the United States district court a petition in bankruptcy. The papers in the case that were taken to Hartford by Attorney Kelley show assets of \$2,988.81, with exemptions by law of \$440, making net assets of \$2,548.81, with unsecured claims amounting to \$2,617.95. WILLIMANTIC PRISONER LATE. Forgot to Have Mother Call Him—Was Fined \$5 and Costs.

Edward Routhier, aged 19, was before Judge W. A. Arnold in police court Monday morning and being a minor entered a plea of guilty to tampering with the fire alarm box No. 73 through W. C. Lyman. Judge Arnold explained that the offense was of a serious nature and that a fine of \$200 and a year in jail could be imposed.
