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like the others authorized to be sold, has been vacant during the years since the town voted to consolidate the schools. There have been times in the past when as many as half a hundred pupils were studying in this district, but times have changed and at present only two pupils are being transported from Mashuetuck to other schools in the town.

Chairman Frank P. Warren of the school committee is familiar with the opinion of the board, however, that the school will be needed by the town at some time in the future, as there are small children in the district and it is at his request that it was voted to retain the Mashuetuck school. The building is the best of any of those which it was proposed to sell, the district having made a considerable expenditure on the property previous to the town adopting the consolidated system.

The buildings that are to be offered for sale are those in the Warren, Horsehill, Ledge and Tucker districts.
