The Wreck of the Republic. The recent fatal accident to the alr-ship La Republic was due to the breakage of the screw propeller. This was first attributed to a flaw in the metal, but the report drawn up by the official committee of inquiry does not bear out the hypothesis. The steel tube of the propeller, closely examined, presented two distinct breakages. The first, or interior breakage, the cause of the fatal accident, is attributed to "over-heating" in consequence of a powerful rotation, attaining 1,600 revolutions per minute. The heat temperature could not support such a speed, and finishes by dilating, and in consequence by snapping.
