INDECENT LANGUAGE

May Be Used by Drunken Man, but Not by Sober Person.
Paterson, N. J., Dec. 23.—By decision of the court of common pleas here today, a drunken man who utters offensive and indecent language commits no offense, whereas a sober man uttering the same language is guilty of a misdemeanor.

The opinion was given in the case of William Hampin, who was discharged by the court today with the comment that, though the intent of the law as it stands is obscure, its effect is clearly ridiculous and should be remedied either by repeal or amendment of the statute.

Galena, Kan., Dec. 23.—A wagonload of beer, whiskey, and other liquors seized in a raid on the club rooms of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, was stolen from the city jail early today by unknown persons. The liquor had been locked up and was to have been used as evidence.
