SNOWDEN-TAFT MARRIAGE IN NEW YORK CITY

Bride a Niece of President Taft—The President Attended. New York, Dec. 30.—Miss Louise Walbridge Taft, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry W. Taft, and niece of the president, was married this afternoon in the home of her parents to George W. Snowden, of Seattle, Washington.

President Taft came from Washington to attend the wedding, but Mrs. Taft's health did not permit her to make the journey. The president was accompanied by his daughter, Miss Helen Taft and his sons, Robert and Charles. He was officially attended by his military aide, Captain Butt.

The ceremony was performed in a room decorated with palms and hung with mistletoe and holly. The bride was attended only by Miss Margaret Lowe, her schoolgirl chum, a maid of honor. The ushers included her brothers. The Rev. Dr. J. G. H. Barry, rector of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, performed the ceremony.

Sanitation Follows the Flag. The health service in the Philippines has been reorganized with a single head, and the bureau of health established instead of a board of health with its cumbersome procedures.

Realizing the necessity for a systematic plan for aiding the deserving poor of Westery, delegates from the various churches assembled in the conference room of the Memorial building Thursday evening and arranged the preliminaries for the formation of an Associated Charities organization. There has been in the past a promiscuous way of giving aid and in some instances the undeserving have imposed on the givers, while the really deserving poor have been neglected.

It is believed that a proper organization will reduce the imposition to the minimum and that the cause of real charity will be better served. This new organization, when completed, will work independently of the charity department of the People's mission, which has been conducted for the past three years, in addition to other missionary work, by Alexander Smith. He has given prompt aid to the needy in many instances, and he will undoubtedly continue on his labors along the line as heretofore, under the title of city missionary.

Local Laocnics. There will be watch night service at the People's Mission. An early evening prayer service will take the place of the customary New Year's watch service.

Missionary Smith made a display of the provisions for the poor of Westery at Christmas and had them photographed with himself for a newspaper cut.

Mary Hughes, wife of Albert Chambray, died Wednesday at her home in White Rock. She is survived by her husband, a son and daughter, two sisters and three brothers.

Thursday was the coldest of the season to date and the thermometer indicating 5 degrees below zero at the pumping station, and 3 above in different sections of the compact part of the town.

Frederick Lueck of Westery is making gradual recovery in a Lowell hospital from a severe attack of typhoid fever. Mr. Lueck was taken to the hospital for treatment of a fractured arm, and the fever developed while in the hospital.

New Britain.—Mr. and Mrs. William B. Taylor of New Britain celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary at their home on Park street Wednesday afternoon.

Suffield.—The barber shops will keep open this (Friday) evening until 10 o'clock and will close at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon in observance of New Year's day.

Winsted.—The water question is occupying the attention of the borough residents more than ever, and it is confidently expected that some action will be taken within the next year to remedy the situation.

Hartford.—The directors of the Charter Oak National bank have elected Morgan G. Bulkeley, Jr., a member of the board of directors to fill the vacancy caused by the death of President J. P. Taylor a few months ago.

Waterbury.—Minnie C. Balfe, wife of Thomas F. Jackson, died Wednesday at the family residence, 162 Willow street. She had been ill but a few days. Mrs. Jackson was the only daughter of the late Michael A. and Catherine Balfe. She was born in Waterbury Feb. 8, 1862.

Bridgeport.—The year 1909 is the banner year in the history of the building industry in this city. In the aggregate value of the buildings constructed it will add approximately \$3,000,000 to the grand list, and exceeds 1907, the former banner year, by about a half million dollars.

The Trade School. The opening of a trade school will be the most important event which has taken place in Bridgeport for many years. It removes the greatest reproach which has rested upon public school education which, outside of the business department of the high school, has confined itself to training teachers and preparing boys for college. The student who wishes to learn some trade is always in demand and will at last be placed on a level with those who pursue callings which, although they are more uncertain, the world has agreed to respect more genteel.—Bridgeport Telegram.

HEREDITY IN THE MINISTRY. At the mammoth reception to Chapman and Alexander recently at Mechanics hall, Boston, a prominent Methodist layman was presented to groups of people as "a disciple of Dr. S. F. Upham." Dr. Upham's memory is fragrant all through New England. He was a masterful preacher; swayed himself and swayed others by a passionate devotion to Jesus Christ. From New England he went to Drew theological seminary as professor of pastoral theology and did a notable work in imparting his own devotion to the young men committed to his care. It is a very interesting fact that all of his sons—three—became useful ministers in the Methodist Episcopal church and that his father was a Methodist minister and a pioneer preacher in this then inhospitable New England. There is no parallel in New England for this family of ministers, except in the case of the late Dr. Daniel F. Dorchester, whose father was a minister and whose son and grandson are also Methodist ministers. Do we not find in these facts a key to the difficult problem: Why do so few young men seek the ministry? Is not the aspiration and influence of the father the determining factor?—Boston Transcript

NEW INDICTMENT AGAINST MRS. JEANETTE STEWART FORD

Alleging Blackmail in Connection with the Big Four Defalcation. Cincinnati, O., Dec. 30.—A new indictment against Mrs. Jeanette Stewart Ford alleging blackmail was returned by the Hamilton county grand jury today. It is designed to cure possible defects in the similar charge returned several weeks ago.

Charles L. Warriner, former local treasurer of the Big Four railroad, and who is under sentence of six years' imprisonment for embezzling, was summoned to the grand jury room before the bill was returned. It was his story that caused the new bill to be voted. The incident on which the new indictment is based is alleged in the bill to have occurred Nov. 1, 1902. Mrs. Ford is charged with having demanded \$2,000 from Warriner on that date, threatening exposure of his shortage if he refused her demands.
