Frenchman Also Broke World's Records for Altitude and Cross-Country Flights

CURTISS WON ALL PRIZES FOR SPEED

But Broke no World's Records—Last Day of International Aviation Meet—Race Between Curtiss and Paulhan Won by the Former—Hamilton Had Narrow Escape from Death while Returning from 15 Mile Flight Toward the Sea.

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 20.—As dusk gathered over the old Dominguez ranch tonight, four flying machines, which had been circling in the air, descended, the aviators walked to their tents, the great crowd fled down the roadway, and the first international aviation meet held in America was finished.

Peary's 1900 Records Returned by King of Denmark.

Washington, Jan. 20.—Arctic records which Commander Peary left in a cairn north of Greenland in May, 1900, when he was making an attempt to reach the North pole, and which were recovered seven years later by the Danish expedition under Mjullus Eriksen, who lost his life in the work, have been returned to the Peary Arctic club by direction of the King of Denmark. A translation of the report of the find of the records is also sent to the club for preservation.

Steamer Seenger Head Drifting Disabled.

St. John, N. F., Jan. 20.—After towing the disabled head line steamer Seenger Head since last Sunday, the Allan line steamer Pompanon lost her prize seven miles off here this morning, when a third hawser broke. The Seenger Head is again drifting.

London, Jan. 20.—Directors of the Bank of England, at their weekly meeting today, reduced the minimum rate of discount from 4 to 3 1/2 per cent. Cheap discount rates, a cessation of demand for gold for the continent during the past week, and the improved monetary situation generally caused the directors to make the change.

Paris, Jan. 20.—The court today dismissed the case growing out of the attempted seizure of lace curtains furnished to the residence in the Avenue du Bois de Boulogne of Mrs. John G. A. Leshman, wife of the United States ambassador to Italy.

Washington, Jan. 20.—After making concrete plans for future convalescence, the conference of governors adjourned today to meet at one of the capitals on a date yet to be determined.

Reno, Nev., Jan. 20.—Mrs. Mae E. Reno, a former opera singer, today was arrested on Oct. 28 on a charge of murdering her husband, Albert E. Talbot, was placed on trial today. Self defense and temporary insanity will be the plea of Mrs. Talbot.

Demands of Mexican Railroad Men Re-fused.

Santa Fe Road Treasurer Dead.

Santa Fe, N. M., Jan. 20.—George L. Goodwin, for quarter century treasurer of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad, died today at the home of his daughter, Mrs. William A. Foster, in this town. He was 82 years old. Mr. Goodwin was born in Charlestown, N. H.

CHAMPION JACK JOHNSON IN NEW YORK POLICE CELL Charged with Felonious Assault—Fight in a Cafe.

New York, Jan. 20.—Jack Johnson, the champion heavyweight pugilist, was arrested in New York tonight, charged with felonious assault, and at midnight the prospects were that he would have to remain in a cell at police headquarters until morning.

The negro's fastidious taste in the matter of drinks was indirectly responsible for his arrest. Nathan Pinder, a black friend of the fighter's, is the accuser. He was sitting in a cafe yesterday, he says, when Johnson came in. Two women companions urged him to buy Johnson a drink.

At headquarters the fighter admitted that he had struck his old friend and said that his only regret was that he hadn't hit him harder. Pinder was swathed in bandages.

REPRESENTATIVE RAINEY WITHDRAWS HIS NAME From Any Consideration as Member of Ballinger Committee.

Washington, Jan. 20.—At a democratic caucus held in the hall of the house immediately after adjournment of that body, Representative Rainey of Illinois, who was placed on the Ballinger-Pinchot investigating committee today by a vote of the republicans of the house, addressed his colleagues and withdrew his name from further consideration in that connection.

Representative James also asked to be relieved from service upon the committee, but upon motion of Mr. Rainey the caucus voted to ask Mr. James to continue. Mr. Lloyd having stated a desire to be left off the committee, the caucus expressed its confidence in Mr. Lloyd and decided to meet again tomorrow night, at which the question of acting upon the latter's successor is to be taken up. A motion was made by Representative Sisson of Alabama, chairman of the caucus, appoint a committee of democrats to consider the question of the vacancy on the investigating committee and to draw up an address to the country, was adopted by the narrow vote of 49 yeas to 40 nays.

MRS. OCEY W. M. SNEAD WAS A MORPHINE USER. Fact Disclosed by Analysis of Contents of Stomach.

New York, Jan. 20.—That Mrs. Ocey W. M. Snead, the victim of the Orange bathtub mystery, was a morphine user, is alleged to have been disclosed by an analysis of the contents of her stomach, which was made out by Dr. Hicks of Newark, N. J., has just completed.

DECLARED NOT GUILTY Of Conspiracy to Defraud Chicago Italian Banker.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—The five persons who were on trial on the charge of conspiring to defraud Pascale Schivone, owner of an Italian bank here, were today declared not guilty. The defendants were implicated by Angelina Schivone, daughter of the banker, who confessed to the theft of approximately \$30,000. The girl, who is a cripple, said she stole the money to give to her uncle and aunt, Francesco Schivone, in order that she might marry her son, also a cripple.

Philadelphia Rapid Transit Employes Talk of Strike.

Philadelphia, Jan. 20.—Although President and General Manager Kruger of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit company today wrote to the executive committee of the Philadelphia union, refusing to accept their proposal for arbitration, the leaders of the union will make further efforts to have their grievances settled before ordering a strike. Organizer Pratt of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employes was badly engaged today in conferring with other labor leaders to secure the support of all union men in case the strike is called.

Mine Explosion, Two Men Killed.

Richmond, Mo., Jan. 20.—Two men were killed and several others injured none fatally, when thirty men were imprisoned in mine No. 6, owned by Pence & Coleman, and situated one mile from here, today, the result of an explosion. The other miners were rescued after being imprisoned three hours. With one or two exceptions they escaped with slight injuries.

Left Elma Dare His Entire Estate.

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 20.—Instead of cutting off Elma Dare, the woman who is now seeking to establish the legality of her alleged marriage to the late George Rhodus, he left her his entire estate, valued at about \$1,000,000, according to a will filed for probate today.

Three Miners Killed by Fall of Rock.

Scranton, Pa., Jan. 20.—Three men were killed and two seriously injured by a fall of rock in the Jermyn No. 1 colliery in this town today. All of the killed were foreign laborers. One of the men were robbing pillows at the time of the accident.
