UNITED WORKERS MAKE CHANGES Mrs. F. A. Mitchell Retires as President After Five Years, Mrs. G. D. Coit Succeeding—Two Legacies Received—Department Reports Show Much Work—Unrestricted Funds Drawn On.

In the Sunday school room of the Second Congregational church on Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, the annual meeting of the United Workers was held, with Mrs. Frank A. Mitchell as president for the past five years, presiding. Because of the snow storm the attendance was not quite as large as usual, but there was a good number present to hear the reports of the important work carried on in various branches and anthropic lines in the past year.

After the meeting had been called to order by Mrs. Mitchell a hymn was sung with Mrs. H. P. Palmer presiding at the piano, and the scriptures were read and prayer offered by Rev. G. A. Northrop, the city missionary. The minutes of the preceding meeting were read, and the report of Mrs. Frank A. Roath, and approved and accepted.

Mrs. Roath read her annual report as secretary, in which she mentioned that it had been necessary in the past year to use some of the unrestricted funds to carry on the work, and the problem of the future would be along this line. She spoke in a general way of the various departments which were more fully covered than the department reports have given. She expressed appreciation to the members of the advisory committee and auditors, thanked the retiring officers for their labors and welcomed the incoming board.
