Town Bills Delayed in Month of Five Mondays—Parade to Firemen's Fair—Death of Miss Mary A. Flynn and Mrs. Julia Lattimore Casey—Stone-Cutters Go South

At a conference of delegates from the Catholic Holy Name societies of Rhode Island, held Sunday in Providence, B. I., the delegates decided on the formation of the Union of the Holy Name Societies of the Diocese of Providence, which includes the societies in Westery. The object is to bring together in one organization all the branches of the organization now in the state and to establish new branches in parishes where none exist. The organization will take up the work of instilling new life into all the branches and stimulating those in renewed activity. The union consists of three lay delegates and a spiritual director from each parish.
